## NOTES FROM ECHO ECHO CELEBRATION

ROUSING FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION.

Incorporation of the Newport Land and Construction Company—Natal Day of Nation Will Be Observed in Teal's Grove—Alberta Men Buying Horses for Shipment—Money Raised for Site for Packing & Storage Company.

Echo, Ore., June 14.—An incorporation is being formed here to be known as the Newport Land & Construction Company of Echo, Ore., for the purpose of buying and selling land and doing a general contract work. The company is capitalized at \$5000, divided into 1000 shares at \$5 a share.

The Fourth of July committee has decided upon the Teal Grove just above town, as the location for the celebration. A very fine race track adjoins the grounds which will be put in first-class shape.

**Buying Horses for Canada.**  
Sam De Rinzy and Mr. Day, of Medicine Hat, Alberta, came in yesterday for the purpose of purchasing horses for the Alberta range. They say people are pouring into Canada from all directions and that it is only a matter of a few years until the range there will be circumscribed.

Mr. Day is connected with Day & Cresswell, very extensive horse dealers of the Alberta district.

An ice cream and strawberry festival will be given Tuesday evening, June 16, at 8 o'clock, at Odd Fellows' Hall, under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid Society of the M. E. church. The proceeds go to the church. This will be the event of the season.

**Packing & Cold Storage Company.**

In response to a call by the chairman a rousing meeting of the commercial association met at the office of L. A. Esteb, at 2 o'clock p. m., on June 13th, to take steps toward securing a site for the much-talked-of Hare Packing & Cold Storage plant. Messrs. Willis and Fletcher were there in the interest of the company, and after an assurance that the money was ready with which to build the plant and that all was wanted to bring it to Echo was grounds for the buildings, and after ringing talks by various members of the association and an expression from all present that they were willing to contribute to the purchase of a site in case one could be secured at a reasonable figure, it was regularly moved and carried that the chairman appoint a committee of three to confer with the representatives of the company and the property owners with reference to a suitable location. The committee was instructed to report back to the body at 8 p. m.

**Will Select From Two Sites.**

Two propositions were submitted to the committee, one each by Joel Holstead and J. H. Coontz. At 8 o'clock the committee reported and recommended that we submit the two propositions to the company and guarantee whichever they preferred. The report of the committee, which consisted of H. G. Newport, A. W. Robinson and J. S. Rogers, was accepted and the committee discharged. It was then moved and carried that the chair appoint a committee of four to see what amount could be raised toward the purchase by public subscription. The chair appointed as such committee H. G. Newport, A. W. Robinson, J. S. Rogers and R. Jones, with instructions that they report to the body at 3 p. m. on June 14th.

The committee started a subscription list and enough is already in sight to fully assure the purchase of the grounds.

**GENERAL NEWS.**

A general merger of the banking interests of the largest cities is under way.

Seven bodies were found in one collapsed house in North Topeka, after the flood had receded.

Cholera is on the increase in the Philippines, aggravated by the prevailing weather there.

Orraine Barrow died yesterday in Paris, the eleventh victim to die of the automobile mishap of May 23.

Charles Muchfeld, of New York City, shot and badly wounded his father, who was beating his mother.

The Order of Railway Telegraphers has declared a boycott on the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad.

Eight thousand dollars worth of diamonds were stolen from J. H. Taylor and wife at a New York hotel.

President Mellen, of the Northern Pacific, has offered to subscribe \$10,000 to Roosevelt's next campaign fund.

Experts estimate the amount of J. M. Watson's defalcation of District of Columbia funds to amount to \$73,000. He was a clerk in the auditor's office.

One of the robbers of the Erie train running east from Chicago, was sentenced Saturday last to three years in the penitentiary. The robbery took place Thursday.

Three men were killed and two fatally injured at Kapowsin, Wash., Saturday, by a run away logging train on the Tacoma and Eastern railroad.

The body of Joseph Southwick, aged 7, who was drowned in Rock Creek, Baker county, Saturday, was found Sunday near the scene of the accident.

The 2-year-old son of Peter Repp, of Starbuck, fell from the O. R. & N. bridge Sunday and was drowned. The mother is prostrated and not expected to live.

Dan Beers, of Silverton, while intoxicated, Sunday, walked off a 90-foot bluff at Oregon City and escaped uninjured. A heavy clump of willows arrested his fall and saved his life.

J. C. Coggins, a notorious money order swindler, who has been wanted by the postoffice department for some time, was arrested in Eugene Saturday night. When taken into custody he fainted.

The largest fish wheel on the Columbia, located near Washougal, and owned by Charles Harder, was swept away Sunday by the high water. It was 20 feet wide and 60 feet in diameter and cost \$3,000.

R. E. Pointer, a farmer residing near Baker City, has been missing since May 29, and foul play is suspected. His home life was always considered pleasant and his circumstances were very good and no apparent cause for his disappearance is known.
