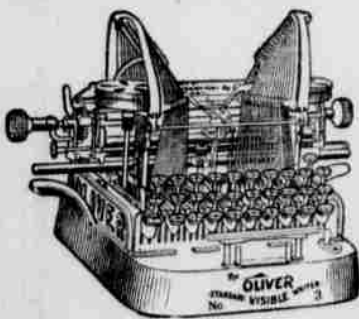

NEW CONTRACT LET

LIME, CEMENT, SAND,
BRICK FOR THE SEWER.

Oregon Lumber Company Was the Lowest Bidder and Will Furnish the Material Mentioned—Chris Ranley Will Put a Glass Front into His Cottonwood Street Property.

The council had a hard time to meet and had a short session last night. Owing to the absence of several of the body a quorum was hard to find, but it was done at last, and the council was called to order by Alderman Clifton, with Johnson, Sommerville, Howard and Switzer responding to the roll call.

The city attorney was instructed to draw an ordinance authorizing the city to enter into a contract with the Oregon Lumber Yard, represented by John A. Borie for the lime, cement, sand and brick needed in the construction of the sewer. The bid of the lumber company was the lowest offered, and the work was given to them by the committee on sewers, having the oversight of the construction. The company offers to furnish Wallula sand at \$2 per yard, Western hard-baked brick at \$19 per thousand, Condor cement at \$4.10 per barrel, and the Giant cement at \$3.85 per barrel.

Permission was granted to Chris Ranley to have a glass front put into his property on Cottonwood street, opposite the city jail. The council then adjourned.

CLOUDBURST ON THE NORTHERN

No. 4 Eastbound Captive of Montana Washout.

Big Timber, Mont., June 17.—A cloudburst between Columbus and Park City this afternoon caused a bad washout on the Northern Pacific. The washout occurred in what is known as Valley Creek, where a large wooden bridge, nearly 120 feet high spans what is usually a dry creek. The water is said to have come down the creek bed in a solid wall over 20 feet high, carrying everything before it and sweeping away one span of the bridge and washing out 30 feet of tracks. The roadbed for nearly a quarter of a mile is covered with debris brought down by the rush of waters. All trains are tied up, and it will be 12 or 18 hours before the bridge and track are sufficiently repaired to permit the resumption of traffic.

News also reached here this afternoon of another washout between Reed Point and Columbus, 15 miles west of the first one, which is delaying trains at that point. This is also said to have been caused by the cloudburst which flooded several miles of country. No. 4, the eastbound Twin-City express, is tied up here tonight.

WOMAN DIED AT 104 YEARS.

Negress at Charity Home Told of Old Times on Long Island.

Walla Walla, June 17.—The oldest inmate of the Colored Home and Hospital, at One Hundred and Forty-first street and Southern boulevard, died last Friday, at the age of 104 years. Her name was Eliza Bates, but all who knew her called her "Mammy Bates." Until the end she had perfect health and her faculties were unimpaired. Only an hour before her death she threaded a cambric needle. She was a maker of patch work, and many of the quilts her industrious fingers put together took prizes at different embroidery shows and church fairs.

TO EXHIBIT OREGON WOOL.

Samples Will Be Exhibited at St. Louis and Portland.

Baker City, June 17.—Henry Blackman, of Heppner, the agent of the St. Louis, also the Lewis and Clark exhibitions, is in the city. Mr. Blackman's specialty is to advertise Eastern Oregon. Wool of the finest quality will be selected from Eastern Oregon flocks and placed on exhibition at St. Louis and later forwarded to the Lewis and Clark exposition which will put Eastern Oregon flockmasters in the front rank. A local wool dealer will collect the samples.

INSULTED HIS WIFE.

Tom Thall is Badly Beaten and Afterwards Pulls His Freight.

Baker City, June 17.—For insulting a married woman in a local lodging-house yesterday, Tom Thall, a cigar-maker, was nearly beaten to a pulp by an irate husband armed with a cane. Thall was later arrested and released on \$25 cash bail. Today he disappeared when his case came up for trial.

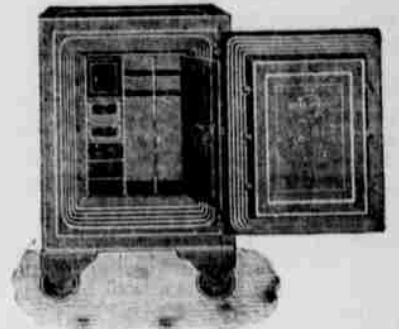
