Pomeroy, Wash, June 22—Mrs. Amanda de Lartheue, who has seen on trial here for three days for the murder of her hosband, last Septem-10. ber confessed to the crime on the wit-25.00 ness stand, late Saturday evening.

the axe, buried his body in a potato hole in the front yard and put his saddle in the hole on top of the corpse.

The couple had lived an extremely unhappy life, she being 20 years the senior of Lartigue and he was an erratic, violent man of coarse habits and quarrelsome disposition.

The defense she had made up

the time of making the confession, was pitifully weak and contradictory. She became entangled in giving her she became entanged in giving her testimony and was confronted by the evidence of over 50 reputable wit-nesses and a web of circumstantial evidence from which there was no

possible escape.
