ABANDONED THE FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION.

HISTORIC STAGE COACH.

Vehicle Now in Pendleton in Which Captain Jack Rode to the Gallows.

Neagle Brothers have at their shop an old stage coach that has a history equal to the famous Deadwood coach carried with the wild west show of Buffalo Bill. It came into the town the other day bearing a load of men who had come here to locate on some land in the vicinity of Pilot Rock and the trip over the sands had so racked its ancient frame that it was necessary to take it to the shop for repairs.

It is now the property of the son of the man who drove it in the old frontier days and he will have it fixed up and save it until like the celebrated one horse stage, it falls to pieces all at once.

In the early days the stage ran on the California and Northern overland route and the name of the company can be faintly seen on the side at the present time.

It was used between the southern stations of this state and the north of California and according to the story told by the present owner, was the center of many an exciting event.

At the time of Captain Jack's war the stage was in use and when that famous chief was caught by the troops in the lava beds the stage was used to haul him to Fort Klamath where he was hanged.

The old reminder of the days gone by will be thoroughly overhauled and taken back to the home of the man who owns it, where it will be kept by him as a pet and only used on state occasions, and will be handed down as an heirloom to the generations that are to come.



GENERAL NEWS.

There was recently opened to settlement in Texas 300,000 acres of state lands.

A waitress in a Kokomo, Ind., restaurant, has fallen heir to \$40,000. Each of her two brothers, both of whom are day laborers, get the same amount.

James T. Metcalf, chief of the money order division of the postoffice department, has been summarily dismissed by Postmaster-General Payne, as the result of the Bristow investigations.

Homer E. Sturdevant, of Buffalo, N. Y., has sued the city for \$25,000 damages, alleging that his 6-year-old child died from the direct effects of vaccination, enforced by the city board of health.

Owing to local factors only clearly understood by the Germans themselves, the enormous socialist vote in Germany is said to more clearly represent an anti-imperialistic, or democratic sentiment than any other one idea.

Eight men who went from Baltimore to California in 1849, had a reunion lately. It is believed they are the only Baltimoreans who survive who made the trip in that year. The youngest is 79 years of age.

The Western Federation of Miners denounces President Roosevelt for his "hypocrisy" in his professions of loyalty to the interests of labor and at the same time sending federal troops to Morenci, Ariz., to intimidate men who are waging a bloodless warfare in defense of their rights.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

An Elks lodge was organized at Olympia Saturday night with a charter membership of 27.

The office of president of the Pacific University, at Forest Grove, Or., has been vacant since the year 1900.

R. L. Short and C. F. Canfield, of Portland, were held up and robbed of \$48 Saturday evening, in Midway Park.

The Tacoma Railway & Power Company has raised the wages of its employes 10 per cent, to take effect July 1.

Holter Tweeton, a miner of Mullan, Idaho, fell 400 feet down a shaft Saturday night, death being instantaneous.

E. W. Bates, of Baker City, who impersonated a United States revenue officer, is in the Portland federal jail under \$1,500 bonds, awaiting trial.

F. S. Hanna, of Colville, Wash., was killed Saturday night by his team starting to run out of the barn and crushing him to death against the door.

Two masked thugs held up a saloon in Spokane Sunday morning, securing nothing but a good fright from the barkeeper, who took several shots at them.

A law providing for the examination of bookkeepers has just gone into effect in Washington and a state board of accountancy has been appointed as examiners.

Miss Ida Grimes, of Kalama, Wash., while returning home on horseback Sunday, from a neighbor's, was attacked by a young cougar which she beat off with a riding whip.

Robert W. Murray, of Seattle, crazed by the refusal of his former wife to live with him, shot her three times Sunday, and then turned the gun on himself. He was instantly killed, but the woman was only slightly injured and will recover.

Damages amounting in the aggregate to \$40,000, were today awarded by Judge Hanford, of Seattle, to the libelants of the steamship Oregon, who were passengers on that vessel on the trip from Nome in September, 1901. The court made a general finding of negligence against the owners of the ship.
