### GENERAL NEWS.

Professor Borely, of Maricoll has discovered a new comet.

William E. Pore, of Oregon, has passed the mental examination for admission to the Annapolis Naval Academy.

Governor Beekham, of Kentucky, announces his intention of bringing the assassins of Marcus to justice if possible.

It is claimed that a compromise has been reached which will enable the Irish land bill to pass the present session of parliament.

It is stated that the statue of the Goddess of Liberty on the capitol at Washington, has been struck by lightning over 100 times.

During the year 1902 there were 72,250 persons injured on the railroads of the United States, of which number 8,588 were killed.

John T. McCutcheon has made a three-year contract to draw one cartoon a day for the Chicago Tribune, at a salary of \$20,000 per year.

Henry Horn died in the poorhouse at Islington, England, lately, aged 84 years. He was in the charge of the light brigade at Balaklava, in 1852.

During the year just closed the railroads of the United States have carried 649,787,505 passengers—the equivalent of eight and one-half tickets for each inhabitant.

Mrs. John Giesendorf, of Albany, a pioneer, aged 70, died Tuesday morning.

Albany woolen mills are now down for general repairs and closing.

Ole Thorson, of Squamish, B. C., was mistaken for a deer Tuesday and instantly killed by his companion.

D. B. Jones, a Portland boy, was drowned at Whatcom, Wash., Tuesday, by falling from a boom of logs.

Leo Chameron was caught on a revolving shaft at the smelting works at Trail, B. C., Tuesday, and instantly killed.

The body of John Courtney, aged 18, was found on the N. P. tracks, badly mutilated, Tuesday evening, near Seattle.

Max Calot, of Portland, was shot by thugs Tuesday morning, while calling for help for his son, who was being robbed.

Sergeant Marginson, of Vancouver, B. C., was seriously injured by the accidental discharge of a gun at drill Tuesday.

Fred Moxley, of Wallowa county, was released from the penitentiary Tuesday. He had served a 4-year term for larceny.

A San Francisco syndicate has purchased a large tract of timber land on Vancouver Island, and will erect there a large saw and shingle mill.

Harry Day, who represented himself to be the advance agent of Ringling's shows, is under arrest at Astoria for obtaining provisions and supplies under false pretenses.

A lone highwayman who attempted to hold up a Selwood electric car in Portland, Sunday morning, was kicked off the car by a passenger, while it was moving, 15 miles an hour.

THREE BRIDGES TAKEN OUT AND ROADS BADLY WASHED.

Some Damage is Anticipated From Grasshoppers—Cattle Buyer in the Neighborhood—The Ridge Sunday School is Prosperous—Wm. Fletcher's Cancer is Improving of Late.

Ridge, June 20.—We have had partly cloudy weather since Monday and just warm enough for rapid growth of vegetation.

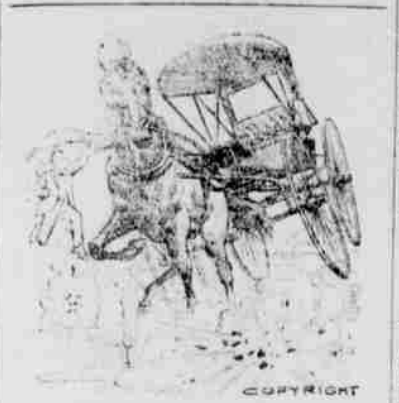
