Portland, June 25.-Nothing new has transpired in the local whea markets during the week. A great many sales have been made to mill ers by holders and stocks have been further cut into. unsold not a great amount of wheat left in the country unsold, as most of the wheat now held is the property of the exporter and miller. Crop reports from every section of the Northwest indicate that the crop of this year will hardly come up to that of the year past. In this state, outside of Umatilia and Sherman counties, the outlook is not very encouraging. The two counties named will have a crop if not damaged by hot winds be harvesting. Fall grain is head ing and in many places the heads seem to be of good size. In the Wil-lamette valley grain is making a good growth, and the plant is very promising. In Washington, Adams county will likely have a very poor crop as this section of the state not benefited by recent rains. The same can be said of a section of Walla Walla county, and unless there is some rain the next few days the crops will be a failure. In Whitman county the outlook is very encouraging for a good crop. Spokane, Douglass, Garfield, all seem to have fair outlooks from reports received from our correspondents. The westfrom our correspondents. The west ern portion of Idaho is in good con-dition. We have no change of prices dition to report, as buyers are buying on the basis of 75c for club and 77c for blue stem. Valley wheat is in demand mostly from mills in California and

prices are firm at 76c per bushel. Flour-The flour market shows but little change over the past week, as all of the leading mills are hard at work on orders that will have to be filled in the next fortnight to go Japan. Very little flour is going to China at present as buyers there are working off old supplies on hand No demand is heard of from South Africa or the U. K. Some good shipments have gone to California. Quotations are without change and range from \$3.75 to \$4.25 per barrel, according to quality and brand.
