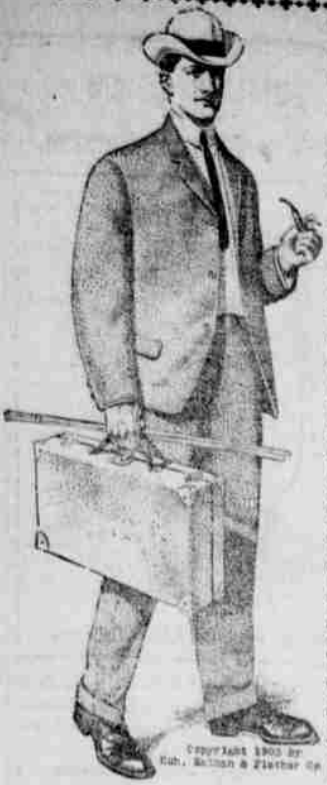

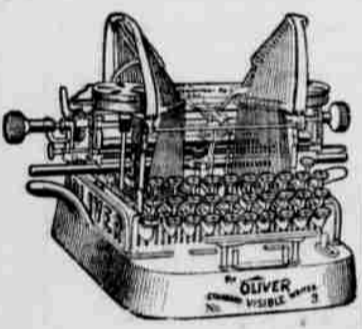

**Will Have to Buy Seed.**  
John Hoffman, who is farming something like 2,400 acres on Eureka flat, returned from a trip through that district yesterday and this morning said that if an average of 15 to 18 bushels per acre were obtained, farmers may consider themselves in luck, says the Walla Walla Statesman. Some fields, he stated, would average much better, but in many instances whole fields of spring wheat and in some instances fall wheat will hardly be worth the cutting. Farmers are now figuring on pulling out even on the year's work and while some will have a little money this year, others will little more than pull even if they do that. Many farmers, it is believed, will be compelled to buy their seed wheat this fall.

### YAKIMA SHEEP NEWS.

Great Number Being Sold and Taken to Reserve Pastures.

North Yakima, Wash., June 26.—John Cleman this week sold 5000 yearlings at \$3 a head, the Wenner Sheep Company sold 1200 lambs to Carstens Bros. for delivery between July 1 and July 15, at \$2.50 a head, and the Berg Sheep Company sold 1500 lambs at the same price for shipment East. These are the first sales of sheep of any consequence made by Yakima sheepmen this spring.

Many of the bands are on their way to the mountains to enter the Rainier forest on July 1. There will 157,000 sheep feed in the reserve this year, or 15,000 less than last year.

Vessey & McRae this week shipped 15 carloads of sheep to Chicago, being the first to be sent to that market this spring. Coffin Bros. also brought 10 carloads into the valley from Oregon to feed for the Puget Sound market, and Frye, Bruhn & Co. shipped four cars to Seattle.

### RELATIVES MUST PAY.

New Law Compels Division of Expense of Caring for Insane.

Salem, Ore., June 26.—The first commitment to the insane asylum under the new law, requiring the husband, parents or guardians to contribute \$10 per month toward the maintenance of the patient, was entered on record yesterday.

Mrs. Grace E. Withrow, the wife of P. L. Withrow, was adjudged insane and ordered committed to the asylum. Mrs. Withrow is a resident of Corvallis, but has for some time been receiving treatment at the Florence sanatorium in this city. She is 20 years of age and this is her first commitment.

### MASONIC TEMPLE.

When \$40,000 is Raised the Order Will Build in Tacoma.

Tacoma, Wash., June 26.—At the meeting of the Masonic Temple Association held last night, it was brought out that more than half of the \$40,000 necessary for the building of the new temple has been subscribed. No soliciting has been done lately, but the committee will start out within a few days and raise the balance, when the contracts will be let. So far only the lodges and a few of the leading members of the society have been asked to contribute, consequently it is not anticipated that there will be any difficulty in securing the balance.

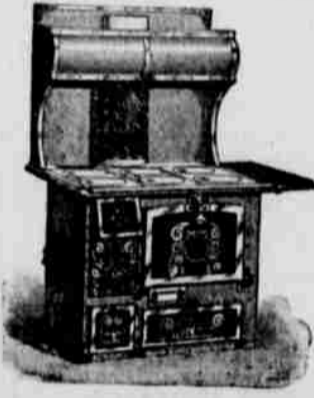
