### GENERAL NEWS.

Pope Leo's health is greatly improved of late.

Yellow fever has put in an appearance on the Isthmus of Tehuantepec.

The socialists will have 81 members in the next reichstag, as against 57 in the last.

There are 3,064 languages in the world, and its inhabitants profess more than 1,000 religions.

The apple orchards of Orleans county, New York, are being decimated by a plague of flies, and nothing yet tried checks their ravages.

Dr. Emily Dunning, the first woman physician to be appointed an ambulance surgeon in New York City, answered her first ambulance call Monday last.

The cashier of the Harmonic Club, an aristocratic Hebrew organization in New York City, has disappeared; likewise \$15,000 of the club's ready money.

Philip Altland died yesterday at New Salem, Pa. He made all arrangements 40 years ago for his funeral, and will be buried in a coffin he himself made in 1863.

A senior in an Indianapolis high school refused to sit beside a negro classmate at the graduating exercises recently, and the authorities promptly refused to give him his diploma.

During the year 1902 57,072,283 passenger miles were traveled in the United States for every passenger killed, and 2,946,272 passenger miles traveled for every passenger injured.

The carpets in the adjusting rooms of the United States mint at San Francisco, were put down in 1897. A few days ago they were taken up, macerated and reduced, and \$9,000 in gold was the result.

An old Syrian woman in Denver, was bound and gagged so tightly that death ensued in her house. The deed was done to enable robbers to get her money. The robbery is supposed to have taken place Saturday last. The body was discovered yesterday.

Fred Barber, aged 15, accidentally fired a blank cartridge into a box of fireworks yesterday at Glen's Falls, N. Y. The merchant's entire stock became ignited and was destroyed, and the interior of the building was wrecked. Several persons were badly burned.

The steamer Innaha has just been launched on Snake river at Lewiston, Idaho.

Five thousand sheep were shipped Tuesday from Baker City to Stockton, Cal.

The street fairs and carnivals at both Albany and Salem are now in full blast.

Prize fighting in Butte will be positively prohibited after the present carnival closes.

George B. Sturgill, a Baker county pioneer, died suddenly at his home near Pocatontos, Tuesday.

Native Oregon granite will be used in the construction of the monument for the Second Oregon regiment.

Six Chinese who came over on the Indopura, were admitted to the United States at Astoria, Tuesday.

Earl Coursen, a sawmill employe at Hastings, near Vancouver, B. C., was cut in halves by a circular saw, Tuesday.

M. J. Morgan, a logger of Tacoma, was struck on the head with an iron bar by a sawmill engineer, Edward Eastman, Tuesday, and will probably die.

Mrs. Mary Kelly, of Seattle, abducted her own child from its grandmother, Tuesday. The Kellys are divorced and the grandparents are custodians of the children.

The body of John G. Van Dyke, who was drowned in Rogue river near Medford, Sunday, was recovered Tuesday afternoon, about 50 yards from where he fell in the stream.

Settlers on the north side of the Columbia complain of the presence and depredations of cougars and mountain lions. Sheep, calves and hogs are missed daily and the animals are very bold in some places.

## THE BUSY DRUMMER

PENDLETON HEADQUARTERS FOR MANY OF THEM.

On Account of Pendleton Being Centrally Located in Their Territory, a Number of Commercial Travelers Reside Here.

Pendleton is the center of the great expanse of the commercial territory of the Inland Empire and as such, is the home and the headquarters of a number of the commercial travelers who work out of this city through the whole of the region east of the mountains, and from far up into Washington, Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Nevada and Utah.

In the western part of this state and in all of the country where the land is covered by the railroads and dotted with the larger cities the domain of the traveler is limited and he is giving way to the mail order and the telephone, but where there is a great expanse of territory, where the towns are far apart and the railroads are in the singular number or not at all, he is a necessity and a boon to the small storekeeper in the village and the index of what is needed to the larger merchant of the towns that claim to be cities.

For this reason, and for the additional reason that Pendleton is a choice place to reside and easy of access to this great territory covered by them, a number of the drummers who work this territory make this their home, or at least their headquarters.

There are several who are regular boarders at the hotels of the city, and who carry their rooms steadily and there are some who have their homes in private families or maintain homes of their own.
