DIOCESE OF OREGON HAD SUCCESSFUL CONVENTION.

W. E. Potwine, of Pendleton, Re-Elected Clerk of Diocese-Two Hundred and Twelve Confirmations During Year,

The fifteenth annual convention of the Protestant Episcopal church, of the diocese of Oregon was held in the chapel of Trinity church, Portland, last week, with a full attendance of the clergy and representatives from twosthirds of the parishes.

The session opened with a celebra-tion of the holy communion. The bishop the Rt. Rev. B. Wistar Morris. D. D., delivered his annual address, reviewing the work of the year, and outlining the needs for the future.

Fewer changes among the clergy ad occurred during the year than uring any previous year, and there were no deaths in the ranks. The bishop reported three new churches opened, and services begun in six new places, with 212 confirmations in the diocese during the year.

The diocesan schools showed a marked increase in the number of pupils over last year, and a spirit of harmony reigned. The Good Samaritan hospital reported that it had re-ceived and cared for over 2000 patients during the year, a considerable percentage of them being taken free

The hospital had been crowded and out any of these precautions, when Schlitz

Rev. W. E. Potwine, of this city, was re-elected secretary and Mr. Paul Van Fridagh, was chosen treasurer

of the diocese.

The convention favored the move ment to find a better and more accurate name for the church which shall efiminate all "sectarian suggestive-ness," and conform more closely to the name in the historic creed of the church. It also endorsed the plan for uniting contiguous dioceses into provinces with provision for appellate rts. A resolution was also adopt-looking toward the merging of the diocesan organization for the re-lief of disabled clergy with that of the general church. Resolutions of general church. Resolutions of flood at Heppner were adopted and provision made for the taking of collections in all congregations toward raising a fund for rebuilding there. Tae Rev. J. E. Simpson, of Portland, read an able paper on 'The Church's Lack of Business Method, the Re-

sultant, and a Suggested Remedy."

After discussion of the same a special committee was appointed to pre-sent the subject in the form of a me-morial, to the general convention of the church in Boston in 1904. The nev. Mr. Potwine and ar. C. H. nev. Mr. Potwine and ar. C. H. Chandler were elected to represent the diocese at the missionary council in Washington, D. C., next October.

Members of the convention and their wives were hospitably enter-

tained during the session at the Bisaop Scott Academy. At the close of the session a reception was tendered the venerable Bishop of the Diocese and Mrs. Morris in the parlors of the and Mrs. Afters were present from adjoining dioceses the bishop of Boise, the Rt. Rev. Dr. Funston; the bishop of Olympia, the Rt. Rev. Dr. Keator and other visiting clergy. 
