EXAMINING BOARD

LAW TO REGULATE THE PLUMBING OF CITIES.

Careless Wording of an Act Passed by the Last Legislature—Who Will Comprise the Board of Plumbing Inspectors in This City?—A Duty That is Up to Mayor Hailey.

At the last session of the legislature there was a law passed requiring the mayor of every incorporated town having 4,000 inhabitants or more to appoint a board of plumbing examiners consisting of two master and one journeyman plumber, who shall meet and organize and who shall look after the plumbing of the city or town and shall examine all applicants who wish to work at the trade.

All towns of 5,000 inhabitants or more shall have an inspector who shall look after the plumbing in the town and see that it is done in accordance with the rules and regulations as made by the council, and all towns having 4,000 inhabitants or more shall make ordinances which shall govern the plumbing in the city and specify as to how it shall be done.

The last section of the law is an example of the carelessness of some of the legislation that is enacted. After going on throughout the act and specifying the duties of the inspectors and the qualifications for the plumbers and all of the details of the law section eight reads as follows:

"Section 8.—Any person who works at the business of plumbing, or maintains or conducts a plumbing shop in any incorporated city or town in the state, containing more than 4,000 inhabitants, or otherwise violates any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof in a justice court of competent jurisdiction, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10, nor more than \$100."

Of course the court would construe the meaning of the act from the text before, but judging by the last clause it is a misdemeanor for a person to engage in the plumbing business after the first of the current month.

Owing to the press of other business the mayor has had no opportunity to appoint the board from this city, but he has had the matter under his notice for some time past and the board will in all probability be appointed in the near future. There are seven plumbers in the city, and from this number the board will have to be appointed. William Keller, L. A. Eddings, M. Keating, T. P. Lund, Paul Paulson, Smith and Sam Sams are all of the men in the city who are at present engaged in the plumbing business, and from their ranks the board will be composed.

WISMER WANTED AGAIN.

Young Man Who Was "Persecuted" in This City is Wanted for Safe Cracking in Seattle.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer of July 4, contains a picture of Floyd D. Wismer, the young man who was arrested by Sheriff Taylor, some weeks ago, on information from the Baker county sheriff, on a charge of forgery in that city. It seems Mr. Wismer patched up his acts in Baker City, sufficient to secure his release, and after spending a few days in this city, he went to Seattle.

On Saturday night of June 27, a safe in the office of the C. B. Smith Manufacturing Company, of Seattle, was blown open by what led the police to believe were expert cracksmen, and \$217 taken. Before the smoke from the explosion had cleared away, a policeman had reached the office and saw no one at the safe nor leaving the building, which at once led him to believe the money had been taken out before the safe was blown open and the safe then cracked to hide the true criminals.

Mr. Wismer and George Briggs, a stenographer in the Smith office, at once left town. The men had been chums since Mr. Wismer's arrival in Seattle, and the circumstances surrounding the crime pointed to their complicity in it.

Wismer and Briggs are now wanted by the Seattle police on a charge of safe blowing.

Shoulder Bone Broke Through Ligament and Stuck.

The rare operation of setting a dislocated shoulder by means of a rope and pulley was yesterday morning performed by Drs. Stiles and Cropp at the Walla Walla hospital, says the Walla Walla Union. The subject was Joe Flavel, who several weeks ago fell through a haymow into a manger below, dislocating his shoulder. Upon examination it was found that the bone had broken through the capsular ligament at the joint, and it resisted the ordinary pressure that could be brought to bear at the hands of the physicians.

ORDER FOR RABBITS.

American Hare Packing Company Closes Contract for Ten Thousand Animals.

The American Hare Packing and Cold Storage Company, of Echo, has closed a contract with Harry Rodgers of Butter creek, for the delivery of 10,000 fat, sleek, young hares, beginning the first of next September.

J. P. Nelson, recently from Wisconsin, has also contracted to furnish a large number of the American hare and will prepare for the business of catching and delivering them alive, as the company has decided to receive them in no other conditions. Mr. Nelson will fence a large tract of sagebrush land with rabbit tight wire fence and make a business of taking the game in large numbers, having a ready market for his entire catch.

The company will take nothing but prime, fat young rabbits, as the market demands only the choicest quality. The deed from the town of Echo to the packing company for one choice block of land, for a cannery site will be transferred this week and the company will then immediately begin the erection of the plant which must be three times the value of the land, according to the terms of the deed.
