ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY MEN NOW EMPLOYED.

Total Available Fund Now Amounts to \$720,000-Money Enough in Sight to Make the Fair a Grand Success.

President Harvey W. Scott, of the lewis and Clark Fair directors, in an address before the board in Portland Monday night, gave some interesting facts concerning the progress of the work. Mr. Scott said in part;

"Work upon the grounds is progressing rapidly. It is the duty of all who take an interest in the coming celebration and exposition to visit the grounds now, and as the work pro-ceeds, and witness the development and transformation. The work of preparation is in the hands of Mr. Oscar Huber, a capable superintend-ent. About 120 men and 50 borses, with necessary implements, are present employed. Within three months the grounds will be ready for buildings. We are following submonths the ground months the ground months the ground modifications, conducive, as we think, to economic results. The committee on economic results is giving close buildings and grounds is giving close attention to this preliminary work. Upon this committee devolves a large share of the responsibility of prepara-

"The state commission has been organized and is now fully ready for co-operation with the directors of this association. As our annual election was so near, we have been waiting till after this event for the close consuitation with the co-operative com-niitee of six appointed by the state commission in pursuance of the act of the legislature, which the success-ful prosecution of this joint undertaking will require.

"Of the fund subscribed in Port-land, \$329,000 will be available for the purposes of the exposition. We hope to increase this amount and have engaged agents to canvass for additional subscriptions.

#### Available for the Fair.

"Of the sum appropriated by the state, \$400,000 will be available for the fair, making a total of \$720,000. This total is exclusive of the sum of \$50,000 from the state appropriation for the exposition at St. Louis, and of the \$100,000 for a permanent memorial building at Portland, to be contributed in equal parts by this cor-poration and by the state commission.

"We hope to obtain from the United States an exhibit which will ado greatly to the interest and success of The historical significance of our celebration will be the basis of our effort at Washington, for with the force of truth we can urge that the centenary of the exploration of the Oregon country is a point of importance in the history of the expansion of the United States worthy beside the acquisition of the scarcely greater Louisiana terri-tory. These sums aggregate \$228,000. Washington will yet come in, and there is a promise that California. vill increase her appropriation. With careful management, we shall have money enough at the disposal of the directors of this corpor ation and of the co-operative commit-tee of the state commission to make all preparations for a creditable and successful exposition, and to open it at the appointed time, in May, 1905, clear of all debt. 
