WORK ON THE FAIR

ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY
MEN NOW EMPLOYED.

Total Available Fund Now Amounts to \$720,000—Money Enough in Sight to Make the Fair a Grand Success.

President Harvey W. Scott, of the Lewis and Clark Fair directors, in an address before the board in Portland Monday night, gave some interesting facts concerning the progress of the work. Mr. Scott said in part:

"Work upon the grounds is progressing rapidly. It is the duty of all who take an interest in the coming celebration and exposition to visit the grounds now, and as the work proceeds, and witness the development and transformation. The work of preparation is in the hands of Mr. Oscar Huber, a capable superintendent. About 120 men and 50 horses, with necessary implements, are at present employed. Within three months the grounds will be ready for buildings. We are following, substantially, the plans outlined by Mr. Olmstead, but with certain modifications, conducive, as we think, to economic results. The committee on buildings and grounds is giving close attention to this preliminary work. Upon this committee devolves a large share of the responsibility of preparation.

"The state commission has been organized and is now fully ready for co-operation with the directors of this association. As our annual election was so near, we have been waiting till after this event for the close consultation with the co-operative committee of six appointed by the state commission in pursuance of the act of the legislature, which the successful prosecution of this joint undertaking will require.

"Of the fund subscribed in Portland, \$329,000 will be available for the purposes of the exposition. We hope to increase this amount and have engaged agents to canvass for additional subscriptions.

Available for the Fair.

"Of the sum appropriated by the state, \$400,000 will be available for the fair, making a total of \$720,000. This total is exclusive of the sum of \$50,000 from the state appropriation for the exposition at St. Louis, and of the \$100,000 for a permanent memorial building at Portland, to be contributed in equal parts by this corporation and by the state commission.

"We hope to obtain from the United States an exhibit which will add greatly to the interest and success of the exposition. The historical significance of our celebration will be the basis of our effort at Washington, for with the force of truth we can urge that the centenary of the exploration of the Oregon country is a point of importance in the history of the expansion of the United States worthy of a place beside the acquisition of the scarcely greater Louisiana territory.

"Many states have already taken active measures for participation in our exposition. Minnesota has made an appropriation of \$70,000, Montana of \$60,000, Missouri of \$10,000, and Arizona \$8,000, North Dakota of \$40,000, California of \$20,000, Idaho of \$10,000, Utah of \$10,000.

"These sums aggregate \$228,000. Washington will yet come in, and there is a promise that California will increase her appropriation. British Columbia has recommended to the Dominion of Canada that \$25,000 be appropriated for an exhibit, and a correspondence on the subject has been opened between the president of this association and members of the Dominion government at Ottawa.

"With careful management, we shall have money enough at the disposal of the directors of this corporation and of the co-operative committee of the state commission to make all preparations for a creditable and successful exposition, and to open it at the appointed time, in May, 1905, clear of all debt. This must be at all times the aim and purpose. After the opening, receipts may be expected to take care of expenses of operation."

BAPTISTS MEET IN ATLANTA.

Special Trains Arriving From Every Port of United States and Canada.

Atlanta, Ga., July 8.—The annual international convention of the Baptist Young Peoples' Union will open here tomorrow for a session of four days. Special trains bringing delegates from every section of the United States and Canada have been pouring into Atlanta since the first of the week, and the adherents of this great organization have literally captured the city. They have possession of a score of the leading hotels from office floor to roof, while accommodations in thousands of private homes have been entered, either as a matter of hospitality or at nominal rates. Estimates this morning of the number of strangers in Atlanta range from 15,000 to 25,000, a goodly number of these, however, coming from the principal towns of this and adjoining states.

The sessions will be held in the Piedmont Park Auditorium, which has been prettily decorated for the occasion. Governor Terrell, ex-Governor Northern and Mayor Howell will deliver addresses of welcome. A large chorus has been rehearsing to furnish the music.

Prominent representatives of the confectionery trade are in attendance from Baltimore, Cleveland, New York, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, St. Louis and a number of other cities throughout the country.
