GENERAL NEWS.

A fiscal agent of San Domingo is in New York trying to secure a loan for his government.

Insane from illness, J. W. Brady, of New York, jumped from a window, sustaining injuries that will result in his death.

A shack worth \$100 burned in British Columbia Monday last. The occupants lost \$700 worth of jewels and silverware.

The craze for long distance automobile races has struck America. The first to occur will be July 25, at Yonkers, N. Y.

The Twelfth and Fourteenth Cavalry will be sent soon to the Philippines. Neither has been in the islands before.

Twenty thousand Methodists from outside the state are expected to attend the general conference at Los Angeles next summer.

Extremely hot weather prevails now in those districts of Kansas, Oklahoma and Missouri which were flooded a short time ago.

Warren P. Noble, a republican member of congress from Ohio during the civil war, died suddenly on Tuesday, of heart disease, aged 85.

The last step toward the military evacuation of Cuba by the United States is the withdrawal now in progress of our troops from Cienfuegos.

Careless banking of fire in the furnace of the steam operated elevators is said to have caused the fire which burned the Studebaker depository at San Francisco.

St. Michaels, Alaska, and Seattle have been connected by a United States telegraph system.

Louis Little, of McMinnville, Or., shot and fatally injured himself Wednesday, while out hunting with a party of friends.

A lone robber held up the Colusa stage near Colusa, Cal., Wednesday morning, and secured about \$300 from the passengers.

John Dobbins, of Butte, was sand-bagged and robbed by thugs on Wednesday morning, dying from his wounds a few hours later.

The steamers Dolphin and Cottage City arrived in Seattle Wednesday, with over \$1,000,000 in gold dust on board, from Nome and the Yukon diggings.

Mrs. Kate Newton, of Oregon City, has been arrested for refusing to connect the sewer pipes from her home with the sewer mains of the city, thereby endangering public health.

The price of hops has dropped to 15 cents per pound in Tacoma. There are now about 4,000 bales of last year's crop left in the hands of Washington raisers.

George Emmanuel, who was sent to the penitentiary last spring from Seattle for burglary, has been pardoned, having been wrongly sent up for a crime of another, who has now been located.

GOING TO SIBERIA.

Idaho Men Will Engage in Fishing, Trapping and Trading in North.

Thomas L. Greenough of Mullan and his three sons, Leo, Paul and John, are on their way to Siberia, where Mr. Greenough is interested in the Northwest Commercial Company, says the Wallace Press.

The party left Seattle last Monday night for Nome, Alaska, where Mr. Greenough expects to confer with several members of the company, after which they will proceed to the land of the czar. Associated with Mr. Greenough in the Russian project are a number of wealthy gentlemen, and the purpose of the company is the launching of a gigantic commercial enterprise, something after the nature of the Hudson Bay Company, which did such a thriving business in the building of the West.

The president of the company is Mr. Roscoe, the man who obtained a concession for the company from the Russian government over 700,000 square miles of territory. The concession is practically without a limit, and grants to the company the use of the fisheries and the sea coast, the right to trap, mine and build mills and trading posts, and to embark in any other manufacturing or commercial enterprise. Trading posts are being built and much other construction work is under way at the present time.

MANGE AMONG STOCK.

Baker County Stock Inspector Finds The Disease in Many Places.

Stock Inspector Jonathan H. Parker, of Baker county, announces that, to his knowledge, there is very little mange amongst horses here, says the Democrat. A few days ago he found two badly diseased animals at the ranch of Schultz, just west of the city and shot them, as the owner declined to have them treated. There were two other animals on the same ranch which the owner is now doctoring. Another horse, sick with the same disease, was found on another ranch, and the case is now being investigated.

Inspector Parker states that it is the duty, under the law, of anyone, having knowledge of contagious diseases in animals, to report the facts at once to the stock inspector, and that anyone retaining such animals without reporting them, is subject to a fine of from \$50 to \$200. Notice to the stock inspector of diseased animals must be in writing. The orders from the state officials in charge are to shoot all diseased animals which are not properly taken care of and treated.

Inspector Parker is very anxious to learn if there are any other cases of mange in this county, which he has not seen or which have not been reported to him.

Three Hundred Dollar Ice Wagon.

The new ice wagon for the Ross Cold Storage Plant has reached the city, and was set up at the Kunkle Implement house yesterday. It is the first up-to-date wagon of the kind that has ever been in the city. It is equipped with a sliding scale box and is arranged most conveniently for the men who carry the ice from a plant to the customers. It was built at a cost of \$300.
