GENERAL NEWS.

The national convocation of Shriners will be held next year at Atlantic City.

The Wildmere, the most famous hotel at Lake Chautauque, N. Y., was burned yesterday. Loss, \$80,000.

Minnie Kraft, the famous mezzo-soprano, born in Chicago, is dying in Vienna of blood poisoning, aged 30 years.

Partial failure in the "cotton belt" has jumped prices of cotton in the general market extraordinarily in the past few days.

Government statistics prove that there are more child laborers in Pennsylvania than in all the Southern states combined.

The firm of Porter Bros., wholesale fruit dealers, which failed two months ago in Chicago, owed \$646,000 in California alone.

Denmark has officially accepted the invitation to participate in the World's Fair and William Arup has been appointed commissioner.

The Smithsonian taxidermist, Geo. H. Turner, is preparing a 16-foot giraffe for exhibition in the government building at the World's Fair.

A union of stenographers and typewriters has been organized at Worcester, Mass., and it is proposed to extend the organization over the entire country.

A San Francisco firm worked up at great expense a splendid corner on Lima beans, only to find that nobody wanted the beans. Assets, \$25,000. Liabilities, \$300,000.

Charles Randall, a very wealthy man of Janesville, Wis., was found dead Wednesday, with a bullet through his head. He lived alone in the outskirts of town.

Oregon City will issue \$12,000 in sewer bonds, on July 13.

Two Lapwai Indians are under arrest at Stites, Idaho for rape.

Haying and harvesting is now in full blast in the Lewiston district.

The health board of Roseburg is causing all the pig pens in the city to be removed.

Dayton, Wash., elects city officers on July 13, and a warm campaign is now in progress.

The Pacific squadron will stop at Bremerton, to take on fuel, on its trip to Alaskan waters.

Max Whittlesey, clerk in the Lakeview land office, has been suspended for crookedness in the office.

J. C. Baker has been sentenced to three years in the penitentiary from Roseburg, for obtaining money under false pretenses.

The last remaining herd of wild horses in the Northwest, has been rounded up at Red Lodge Basin, Wyoming, by ranchmen.

The Columbia River & Northern will burn oil after July 15. This change is made partly to prevent fires in the ripening grain fields.

Adolph Schoene, a Portland dairyman, was seized with cramps and drowned in the Willamette river, Thursday morning, near Portland.

A negro burglar was so closely pursued in La Grande, Thursday, that he left his shoes behind in a house he had entered. He was caught at Hot Lake, barefooted.

A cargo of lime on the steamer Lacomme, caught fire Thursday, and the vessel was beached at Burroughs Bay. The vessel and cargo were destroyed to the water line.

E. T. Oglesby, colored, wanted for murder at McHenry, Miss., has been arrested at Everett, Wash. He is a desperate character and is known all over the South as "Florida Pop."

Abel Uglov, a prominent citizen of Dallas, Or., swallowed a glass of electric battery fluid for port wine, Thursday. He was immediately treated with antidotes and will recover.

SCHOOL HOUSE WILL BE ENLARGED THIS SUMMER.

Two Grades Will Be Added to the Public Schools—Election to Vote on a Bond Proposition Will Be Held July 18—Lewiston Parties Here to Invest.

Echo, Or., July 9.—At a meeting held at the schoolhouse yesterday afternoon for the purpose of voting upon the question of building an addition to the house, and adding the ninth and tenth grades to the school, there was considerable enthusiasm shown.

One prominent citizen claimed that such a thing was not needed. This brought a spirited reply from Joseph Cuhna, who stated that in his judgment it was very much needed, and that the addition to the schoolhouse must be built, and would be built if he had to do it unaided. This met the approval of a large majority of those present, and upon a vote it was decided to build and create the additional grades.

It was also decided to call a meeting next Saturday week to vote upon the question of bonding the district. Too much credit cannot be given Mr. Cuhna. A few more such enterprising citizens will place Echo upon the road to success, where she deserves to be.

NEW PRISON PHYSICIAN.

Dr. John D. Shaw Chosen to Succeed Dr. Cusick.

Governor Chamberlain yesterday concluded to accept the resignation of Dr. W. A. Cusick, as physician at the penitentiary, which was tendered several days ago on account of the doctor's private practice consuming too much of his time, and appointed Dr. John D. Shaw, an eminent and successful practitioner of this city, to fill the vacancy. Dr. Shaw was born in Lansing, Iowa, in 1862. He came to Oregon three years later and took up his residence in Salem. Later on he pursued a course of medicine in the medical department of the Willamette University and graduated with high honors in Portland in 1895. He has been a lifelong and steadfast democrat.

Dr. Shaw has gained the prominent place he occupies in his profession by hard study and close attention to his patients, and his legion of friends will be gratified to learn of the honor which has been thrust upon him. He is deserving of it in every respect.—Salem Statesman.

ANOTHER PIONEER GONE.

Sylvester Grier, of Baker City, Dies of Paralysis.

Baker City, July 10.—Sylvester Grier, one of the foremost pioneers of Eastern Oregon, died yesterday evening of paralysis.

Mr. Grier came to Eastern Oregon in 1861 and settled at Baker City in 1864, where he mined and prospected until 1871, when he started a feed and livery barn, which he conducted continuously until 1896. During 15 years of this time he was associated with J. C. Kellogg in the business.

He has been suffering with paralysis for about six years. He leaves a large family of grown children.

He was a native of Pennsylvania, having been born in that state on July 5, 1830.

He was a pioneer Odd Fellow and the funeral service will be conducted this afternoon by that order.

MOTHER ENDORSED THEFTS.

Harry Fisher Had Been a Thief for a Year Past.

Salem, Ore., July 10.—Harry Fisher, the youth who was arrested Tuesday night having property in his possession belonging to the firm of Joseph Meyers & Sons, in this city, was given a charge of petit larceny, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to serve 60 days in the county jail.

The crime committed was far more serious than that of which he was convicted, but on account of his previous good character the private prosecutors had no desire to punish him very severely for this, his first offense. Two members of the firm, however, made a trip to Portland yesterday to see if the boy's mother, who is ill at St. Vincent's hospital, and from her it was learned that the boy had been carrying on his thieving practice for over a year, and that the young culprit had stolen almost every kind of an article imaginable from the store, from a comb to a woman's suit and a three-quarter jersey coat of the value of \$250. It is understood that the mother, owing to her illness, will not be implicated in the matter.
