GENERAL NEWS.

Ex-City Clerk D. C. Weyand, of Cripple Creek, Col., is short in his accounts with the city \$25,000.

Rear Admiral Cook is recovering from a severe attack of grip, which was his first illness in 49 years.

It is believed in the more prominent political circles that a special session of congress will be called to meet November 9.

John Merkowitsch, a cousin of the present king of Serbia, has worked at the trade of turrler in New York City for 40 years.

The new \$3,000,000 depot in Chicago, belonging to the Lake Shore, Rock Island and Nickel Plate, has just been opened.

The sentence of dishonorable discharge from the army of Lieutenant L. M. Bushfield, of Vancouver, has been confirmed by the president.

The opinion is gaining ground that the czar will receive the protest and petition from America in relation to the treatment of Jews in Russia.

King Peter of Serbia has promoted Colonel Machias, who led the party of rescuers which killed King Alexander, to be departmental chief of the war ministry.

Wireless telegraphy has not proven to be a success in the Hawaiian Islands, the government of which has voted a subsidy of \$1,000 per month for further experiments.

Japan indicates that further Russian aggression around the Yellow Sea is liable to be followed by a scrap. It is presumed she has selected a nice lot in the international cemetery and left an order for disinfectants and flowers.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The California hop crop is fully 50 per cent short of the usual output.

The O. R. & N. Co. is now enlarging the depot building at Baker City.

The Oregon State Chautauqua meets at Gladstone Park, near Oregon City, on July 14.

A new 20-stamp quartz mill will be built in the Cable Cove district, near Sumpter, this season.

R. L. Flick, of Portland, is under arrest for strangling his wife almost to death, Sunday morning.

Salem butcher shops are now engaged in a rate-cutting war, much to the satisfaction of the customers.

Two city prisoners of New Westminster, B. C., broke away from the chain gang on the streets Saturday, and have not been recaptured.

E. W. Hamilton, a convict in the Salt Lake penitentiary, committed suicide Sunday morning, by hanging himself with a strap from his bunk.

The Willamette Prune Growers, of Salem, have begun a movement which is intended to unite all the prune growers of the Northwest in one body.

Fred Stine, of Baker City, has been appointed superintendent of the Cornucopia mines, in place of Fred Dobler, who was killed in a snowslide, last winter.

Sheriff Denholm, of Pierce county, Washington, has three bloodhounds now on the trail of Smith, the insane murderer of Marshal Parsons, of Centralia.

As a result of a range war on Sage creek, Montana, warrants are now out for 12 prominent stockmen, who are accused of attacking a woman and her herder on the range.

Captain George Hunt, keeper of the Cape Meares lighthouse, at Tillamook, and one of the oldest men in the lighthouse service on the coast, died at Tillamook of pneumonia, Sunday.

Phillip Miller, a Seattle bartender, is under arrest for striking O. M. Galloway over the head with a bottle, inflicting probably fatal injuries, because Galloway had no money with which to pay for drinks he had ordered.

Workmen engaged in grading a street in Astoria, Saturday, discovered what must be an ancient Indian grave, as a skeleton, two rusty rifle barrels, a string of beads, a sack of ancient Mexican dollars, and a red sandstone pipe, containing an engraved likeness of Benjamin Franklin, were found in it.

Semi-Annual Statement of State Treasurer Moore—Cash on Hand Over One Million Dollars Jan. 1, 1903.

Salem, July 11.—State Treasurer C. S. Moore yesterday compiled and issued his statement of the receipts and disbursements of his department for the six months period ending June 30. The report shows that there was a balance on hand January 1, 1903, of \$1,122,796.11; the receipts for the six months amounted to \$1,196,334.75; the disbursements, \$1,040,994.44, leaving a balance of \$1,278,136.42 on hand July 1, 1903. WHAT THE INSANE COST OREGON TAXPAYERS.

List of Prices Paid for Supplies at State Institutions—Drugs for the Year Cost \$1210—One Thousand Barrels of Flour, \$3435.

The board of asylum trustees have received and opened the bids for the supplies for that institution for the ensuing year. Up to yesterday contracts were only awarded for the meats, hardware, tinware, plumbing supplies and fish, and the bids for the groceries and dry goods are still under consideration, and will probably not be awarded until next week. The contract for furnishing the beef and the mutton was awarded to E. C. Cross, of this city, at \$5.60 per hundredweight for the former and \$4.90 for the latter, while the ham and bacon contract was awarded to E. Hoff at 19½ cents per pound for the ham and 14 cents for breakfast bacon, and 12½ cents for heavy bacon.

The hardware and tinware contracts were awarded to Gray Bros. and R. M. Wade & Co., of this city, at \$130.87 and \$228.21 respectively, as per the list of articles furnished. The tinning contract was given to Gray Bros. at \$133.28. M. J. Petzel, of this city, will furnish the plumbing supplies called for, for \$67.75, and the fish contract was awarded to the Portland Fish Company at the following prices: Haddock, 6 cents; Chinook salmon, 7½ cents; Steelheads, 8½ cents; Silver-sided, 6 cents, and bluebacks at 6 cents.

Yesterday afternoon, however, the consideration of the bids was resumed and a few more contracts were awarded, although the bids for groceries, dry goods, leather and findings, and boots and shoes are still under advisement, and will probably be let today. Balfour, Guthrie & Co. were given the contract for furnishing 1000 barrels of flour at \$3.435 per barrel; 30 tons of No. 1 bran at \$1, and 15 tons of No. 1 shorts at \$21, and the Salem Flouring Mills Co. will furnish the graham flour at \$3.49 per barrel. Patton Bros. were awarded the stationery contract, while Woodard, Clark & Co., of Portland, secured the contract for the ink. The Capital Drug Company, of this city, has the contract for furnishing the drugs for the institution for \$1210.20, and Meier & Frank Company, of Portland, and Harritt & Lawrence, of this city, will supply crockery and glassware.

Bids were also opened at the penitentiary yesterday afternoon for the supplies for that institution, and, although all of them were tested, no contracts were awarded except for the best, which was given to Stensloff Bros. at \$5.25 per hundredweight, while the other bids will be compared and contracts perhaps awarded today.
