GENERAL NEWS.

The Reliance won the trial yacht race Saturday last, coming out over a mile ahead.

E. B. Zeigler will attempt to reach the North Pole with dog teams. He will outfit at Vancouver.

Infected water in the Pasig river is the origin of the present cholera epidemic at Manila. Only natives are affected.

During the year just ended, 41 steel freight steamers were built on the Great Lakes, compared with 52 in the year previous.

The Santa Fe shopmen at La Junta are on a strike, and the shopmen at Topeka, where 3,000 are employed, may go out in sympathy.

Secretary of War Root has notified Governor Chatterton, of Wyoming, that there will not be any army maneuvers in Wyoming this year.

An explosion of sewer gas in Chicago seriously injured four men, city employees. The noise of the explosion was heard a long distance.

The fire losses in the United States and Canada for the month of June last, amounted to \$14,844,350, or \$4,000,000 more than during the corresponding month a year ago.

During the year which closed June 30, 1,535 vessels, of 456,076 gross tons, were built in the United States, as against 1,657 vessels, of 473,181 gross tons, during the preceding year.

During the year ending June 30 last, 18 ocean steel steamers with a gross tonnage of 101,471 tons, were built on the American-Atlantic seaboard, which broke the record for any one year.

An analysis by John Marshall shows the net earnings of the United States Steel Corporation for the past year to be \$61,508,235. This sum is equivalent to six per cent interest on the total bond issue of the company for five years.

Expert inspection of the books of the auditor of the District of Columbia, reveals that there has never been any check upon any superior of fiscal who wished to steal by revision, checking up or proving. J. M. A. Watson, who was a clerk for years, is short \$73,297.

Twenty-four of 30 bakeries in Seattle were found to be violating the pure food law, Saturday.

The differences between the typographical union of Spokane and the Review are still unsettled.

Twenty combined harvesters started to work in the Big Lost Lake country, Idaho, Monday morning.

Lewiston, Idaho, is to have a Carnegie library, the building for which is to be erected this season.

The New Pecos County (Idaho) Pioneer Association will hold a reunion at Lewiston Wednesday, July 22.

E. C. Crowell, under arrest at Seattle for being implicated in the poisoning of Mrs. Mull, has been released.

An electric road costing \$2,000,000, is proposed between Butte and Salmon river, Idaho, a distance of 187 miles.

The telephone girls at Republic, Wash., are forced to climb the poles and repair wires on account of the strike of the linemen.

Mrs. Asa Storress, of Vancouver, Wash., was fatally injured Saturday by falling from a load of hay and striking upon a pitchfork.

William H. Taff, a civil engineer of Olympia, Wash., will be taken back to Manila for trial, on alleged crookedness in government service.

William Martin, a Missoula, Mont., pioneer, died Sunday of a gripe, aged 86. He was sheriff of Kootenai county, Idaho, for three terms.

The largest cattle deal reported from any point in the West, this year, was made at Salmon City, Idaho, Saturday. Senator Shoup sold 1,000 head of stock cattle at \$25 per head.

SPOKANE RESERVE

OVER ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND ACRES LIABLE.

Five Hundred Fifty-Five Indians Will First Receive Eighty Acres of Land Each—No Action Till After Allotment.

Washington, July 20.—It is expected that under the contract recently authorized the survey of the lands of the Spokane Indian reservation in Eastern Washington will be completed early in the summer of 1904, and as soon thereafter as possible allotments of 80 acres each will be made to every Indian man, woman and child properly on the reservation. The balance aside from a small area reserved for schools, grazing, etc., will be opened to exploration, location, occupation and purchase under the mining laws, as provided in the last Indian appropriation act.

The Spokane reservation contains approximately 152,000 acres and according to the last census taken by the school authorities, the population is 555, of which number 271 are Lower Spokane, and 184 are Upper and Middle Spokane. Each of these Indians will be entitled to 80 acres of agricultural land on the reservation, which is equivalent to a total allotment of about 44,000 acres. Allowing 5,000 acres for schools, grazing lands and other public purposes, there will in round numbers, be about 100,000 acres of the reservation to be opened by presidential proclamation.

It will be recalled that immediately after the passage of the Indian appropriation act in the first session of the past congress, a number of prospectors rushed onto the Spokane reservation and attempted to acquire lands under the mineral laws. Two days after the act was signed, a subsequent resolution was passed annulling the opening feature of the law as applied to the Spokane reservation until after allotments were made. The original act had been passed on the assumption that allotments had been made which was not true. The supposed rights of those who entered the reservation in the two days prior to the passage of the amendatory resolution will not hold good unless those same parties renew their applications after the issuance of the presidential proclamation next summer.

LITTLE CHILD SHOT.

Pistol Accidentally Discharged by Falling From Wagon to the Ground.

The five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Warren was shot accidentally Saturday evening near Sumpter and died a few hours later. The members of the family were en route from the Palouse country to Rogue River valley and were preparing to camp. In lifting the bedding out of the wagon a revolver was thrown onto the tongue and exploded, the bullet passing through the little one's body. The father is a member of the Knights of Pythias and Odd Fellows lodges. The funeral was held yesterday under the auspices of these lodges.
