Olympia Pioneer Dying.

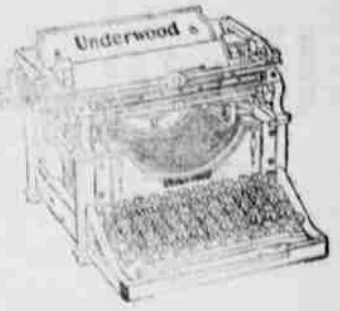
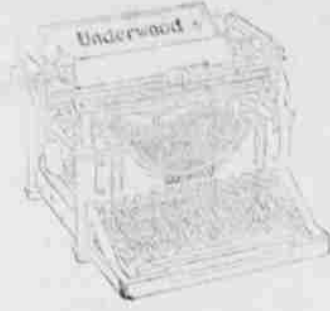
