LIGHT FOR STATE

CONTRACT FOR FOUR
YEARS ENTERED INTO.

New Rate Effects a Saving of \$4,000
Per Year—Oregon Will Construct
and Operate Her Own Light Plant
When This Contract Expires. Prob-
ably.

Salem, July 24.—The state board of
building commissioners held a meet-
ing yesterday afternoon and, after
having opened the bid of the Citizen's
Light and Traction Co., formerly the
Salem Light, Power and Traction Co.,
the only one submitted for the light-
ing of the penitentiary, asylum, capitol
building and the blind school, and
after a long consultation with local
manager J. W. Springer and J. H.
McNary, the company's attorney, de-
cided that the bid submitted was at
the lowest bid rate and that,
for the time being it would be cheap-
er to contract at these figures than to
erect a plant for the state and it was
definitely decided upon, although the
contract has not been drawn up, to
enter into a four-year contract with
the company.

The new rate offered by the com-
pany will effect a saving of about
\$4,000 per year over the rate of the
present contract and, although a
much cheaper rate was quoted on a
10-year contract the board did not
consider it good policy to tie up the
state for that period, for there is no
knowing what a change in conditions
will take place in that time and the
state may decide to build a plant of
its own before many years.

The terms upon which the board
will let the contract, also allowing the
rate offered for a 10-year contract by
the company, follows:

For separate buildings, arc lights
per month, \$6.50; four years.

For separate buildings, arc lights
per month, \$6.25; 10 years.

For all four institutions, arc lights
per month, \$5; for four years; and
\$5.75 for 10 years.

For 16-candle power incandescents,
per month, or four-year contract for
each building, 35 cents for each
lamp installed, flat rate, or 8 1/2 cents
per 1000 watt hours, meter rate. On
10-year contracts, 22 cents, flat rate,
or 7 1/2 cents meter rate.

On contract for all buildings for in-
candescents, flat rate, 30 cents; watt
rate, 7 cents for four buildings, and
25 cents and 6 1/2 cents for 10 years.

The company put up a certified
check for \$2,500, for faithful execution
of the contract in case it was award-
ed.
