THE WEEK'S WEATHER.

Two Very Hot Days Mark the Record of This Week.

Aside from two very hot days—Friday and Wednesday—the past week has been uneventful from the point of view of the weather observer. The week's record was broken by a 102 degree about 2 p. m. on July 2, and a like temperature was recorded on the 21. The nights have been much warmer this week than during the previous week, the lowest temperature reached being on the 17th, when the thermometer registered 59 degrees. Thirty-six was the lowest temperature of the previous week. Following is the summary:

FINE PRESSED BRICK.

New Departure a Pronounced Success at Weston Yard.

About 2,000 pressed brick are being manufactured daily at the Weston yard, says the Weston Leader. They are perfect in every detail, and are bound to add to the fame that Weston common brick have acquired for their consistent excellence.

The brick are first carefully molded and are without a flaw when subjected to the enormous pressure of the "press." When taken out of this machine and dried in the "bake" they are burned in the kiln with ordinary brick. The word "Weston" stamped upon one side in clear-cut letters is the name of the little city that they will fitly advertise in the building world.

Just now an order for 25,000 pressed brick is being filled. It was placed by Hon. Walter M. Pierce, state senator, and the brick will be used for the walls of some handsome cottages to be built at Hot Lake, the celebrated resort in which Mr. Pierce is so extensively interested. Several other orders are also in sight.

WALLA WALLA HARVEST.

Crops Running From 20 to 30 Bushels Per Acre.

Harvesting upon the hills and in the valleys of the wheat belt south of Snake river is in full blast, and thousands of men are busily engaged gathering in the golden grain, says the Statesman. The season is some two weeks late, but the weather is ideal, and work will be rushed with all possible haste.

Headers and combines can be seen in operation on every hand, while threshers are busy in many places following in the wake of the header.

From reports received from early threshing the crop will be light, but it will average much better than had been expected. Crops of 20 to 24 and 30 bushels are not uncommon, and while some spots will run below these figures, the average will be fair throughout the county.

Prices are ranging from 65 to 70 cents at the opening of the season, and indications seem favorable for strong prices throughout the harvest months. The figure is some 15 to 20 cents higher than that of last year at a similar time, and prospects for a steady market and fair prices are much better than they were 12 months ago.
