BISHOP OF BUFFALO BRIG.-GEN. WOOD

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY AT ST. PATRICK'S CATHEDRAL.

Bishop Colton Received Costly and Beautiful Presents—Story of an Interesting Life—Will Preside Over the Spiritual Lives of One Hundred Seventy One Thousand Catholics.

New York, July 25.—The ceremonies attending the consecration of Rev. Charles H. Colton as bishop of Buffalo in St. Patrick's cathedral this morning were of a most impressive nature. The cathedral was crowded to its utmost capacity with the most prominent Roman Catholics of this city and vicinity, together with a large delegation from the diocese of Buffalo.

The ceremony was conducted by Archbishop Farley, who was assisted by Bishops McQuaide, of Rochester, and McDonnell, of Brooklyn. Other prominent priests and prelates were in attendance from various parts of New York, New Jersey and New England. The sermon was preached by Bishop McFaul, of Trenton.

At the conclusion of the ceremonies many costly presents were bestowed upon the newly consecrated bishop. These included a set of gold mitres from the Alumni of Troy Seminary, where Father Colton studied, a costly gold crozier from St. Stephen's parish, and an Episcopal ring from the school children of his old parish.

New Bishop's Biography.

Rev. Charles H. Colton, the new bishop of Buffalo, was born in New York city in 1848. He was graduated from St. Xavier's college in the class of 1872, and was ordained a priest at St. Joseph's Seminary in Troy in 1876. His first pastorate was at St. Stephen's, New York city, as assistant to the late Dr. McGlynn. Father Colton remained at St. Stephen's until 1888, when he was sent to Port Chester, but the year following, when Dr. McGlynn's difficulties there at St. Stephen's parish into a turmoil and resulted in his excommunication, Father Colton was recalled and was entrusted with the difficult task of building up a harmonious spirit in the parish, and at the same time wiping out a threatening debt. The result of a few years' work was that St. Stephen's parish was reunited, the debt was cleared from the church, and St. Stephen's school was established as one of the strongest of its kind in New York. By this service Father Colton won the highest esteem in ecclesiastical circles and in 1890 Archbishop Corrigan made him chancellor of the diocese, to succeed Mr. Mooney when the latter became vicar general.

The diocese of Buffalo, to which Bishop Colton has been elevated, was established in 1847. It has an area of 7,900 square miles. The estimated Catholic population is 171,000, and there are in the diocese 213 priests, 150 churches, 73 parish schools, and 2,450 scholars.

STILL MORE COTTON. No Evidence That the Industry is on the Decline.

Washington, D. C., July 25.—In spite of predictions from the South that cotton cultivation in the South is diminishing and that ravages of the Mexican cotton-boll weevil and the lack of necessary labor will prevent the cotton output from ever again reaching its former figures, information gathered at the department of agriculture shows that the officials of the department whose work it is to study cotton conditions, are of the opinion that cotton growing has not yet reached its zenith. In speaking of the future prospects of the cotton crop, John Hyde, statistician of the department, says:

"If the ravages of the cotton-boll weevil can be prevented, I do not believe that the time is far distant when this country will produce 20,000,000 bales of cotton annually. At present the boll weevil undoubtedly constitutes a serious menace to it. It is not only the actual damage that this insect does that operates against the increase of the production of cotton in certain districts, but its moral effect in discouraging planters from setting out large crops, is also very serious."

MONTANA WOOLGROWERS.

NEW MAN IN COMMAND IN THE PHILIPPINES.

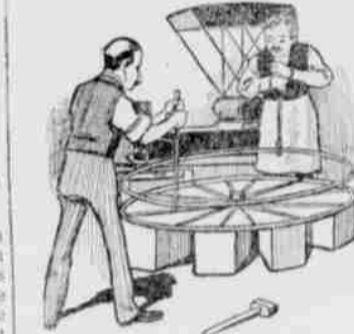
Major General G. W. Davis, Present Commander in the Islands, Will Soon Go on the Retired List—Other Important Changes Will Soon Follow—Sketch of the Retiring General's Life.

Washington, D. C., July 25.—Major General George W. Davis, commanding the division of the Philippines, will be placed on the retired list tomorrow by operation of the age limit. Several important changes and promotions among high army officers follow as a consequence of his retirement and the eventual result will be to place Brig. Gen. Leonard Wood in command of the Philippines in a short time. The retirement of Gen. Davis places Major General James F. Wade in command of the Philippines and promotes Brig. Gen. Samuel S. Sumner to the vacancy in the grade of major general. Major General Wade is now second in command in the archipelago and Sumner is next to Wade. Both these veteran officers have been in the Philippines for nearly three years, Sumner having had service in China under Chaffee before going to the islands. In recognition of their long service Wade is to be brought home and assigned to the command of a department. The same course will be followed in the case of Sumner, thus leaving General Wood the senior military officer and in supreme command.

An Honorable Career.

With the retirement of General Davis the government loses one of its ablest and most honorable and useful servants. His career, covering more than 40 years, has been full of honors and credit, and few officers of the army have served the flag in more widely-separated localities. He first entered the service as a quartermaster sergeant of the Eleventh Connecticut Volunteers, Nov. 27, 1861, and advanced through various grades to that of major in 1865. He entered the regular army as a captain of infantry in 1867, was promoted to colonel in 1879 and to brigadier general in 1901, having served as a brigadier general of volunteers during the Spanish war, and was appointed governor general of Porto Rico.
