## CHANGES IN DEPOT

ALL BUSINESS UPSTAIRS  
EXCEPT TICKET OFFICE.

About \$1,400 Will Be Expended Upon the Structure—Work to Begin Very Soon—Both the Waiting Rooms Will Be Enlarged and Made More Convenient—Building Will Also Be Repainted.

For some time the people who have had to travel over the O. R. & N., have been aware of the fact that the depot at this place was sadly in need of some changes for the convenience of the public, and it seems that the company has been of the same mind, for they have all the time been considering the matter, and have drawn plans for an extensive remodeling of the lower floor and the changing of the upper floor. When the changes have been made the depot will be modern in its arrangements, and will be amply large for years to come.

It is the intention of the company to take out one of the office rooms in the lower floor and convert the whole lower part of the building into space for the ticket office and the waiting rooms. The telegraph and ticket offices will be in the middle and a little to one side of the main room. In front, or on the side next to the main line, there will be a hallway about six feet wide which will pass in front of the ticket window. There will be but the ticket office on all of the lower floor, so that all the rest of the space will be occupied by the waiting rooms. The women's room will be at one end of the building next to the baggage room, and will be as wide as the depot and will extend from the baggage room partition to the partition of the ticket office, or about 30 feet. The small room now used by the trainmen alone on the front side, will be torn out and the passageway will be built there. The men's waiting room will be practically the same as it is now.

The entire interior will be remodeled and repainted, and the place will be as good as new when the men get through with the work.

On the upper floor no great changes will be made in the arrangement of the building other than to put a partition in the room now occupied by the offices of the bridge and building department. This big room will be cut in two and the office formerly down stairs will be moved up there in one of the rooms thus made.

The work on the changes will begin in a day or so and will be pushed through as rapidly as is possible. It will cost the company in round numbers, \$1,400 to make the change and move the offices.

### FOR PASSING BOGUS PAPER.

#### Young Man Arrested for Making False Check.

F. W. Parker, a young man who has been employed in the city for three weeks, was arrested at Milton yesterday afternoon on a warrant charging him with forgery, says the Walla Walla Statesman. A few days ago he secured a check from A. H. Harris after banking hours. It was cashed on Julius Levy. On Thursday he presented another check similarly signed for \$40, and Mr. Levy advanced the money. Later in the day Parker called and returned the money, taking up the check. An information was filed in the superior court, and preliminary hearing will likely occur Monday. Parker has been in the city but three weeks.
