GENERAL NEWS

The boiler of a threshing machine exploded at Brockton, Ill., yesterday, killing two men.

In the wreck of an excursion train at Glasgow, Scotland, wherein 13 persons were instantly killed, one entire family was wiped out.

Laurence Murphy, treasurer of the New York Stonecutters' Union, has been found guilty of larceny by embezzlement of \$10,000 of the union's funds.

Professor David Starr Jordan declares that systematic and extensive propagation of the species in hatcheries is necessary to keep up the supply of salmon.

More than a score of 'employment agencies' in New York and Brooklyn have been closed and their licenses revoked as it was ascertained that they were exchanges or fences for prostitutes.

One hundred carloads of fruit are being shipped every day eastward from Sacramento. Forty-one million two hundred eight thousand pounds of fruit have been shipped from Sacramento this year to points east of Ogden, Utah.

The Hearst syndicate of newspapers, including the Examiner, the Chicago American and the New York American, are now considering the plan of taking up the Lewis and Clark Fair, and booming it for all it is worth, for the purpose of benefiting the entire Pacific Coast.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The California fruit crop this year is estimated at 8,000 carloads.

Lee Clemens of Drain, was held up Monday and robbed of \$7. by two footpads.

Daniel McKinnon of Kaslo, B. C., was horribly mutilated Monday, by a blast, which he was examining.

B. Burrell, of Salmon River, B. C., was fatally injured Monday by falling from the top of a hay stack, on to the prongs of a pitchfork.

A severe wind and hail storm in the vicinity of Spokane, Sunday night, did many thousands of dollars worth of damage to crops and orchards.

Farmers and landowners of Meyer's Falls, Wash., are preparing to build an electric road from Spokane to the interior, a distance of 50 miles.

E. H. Harriman has ordered the withdrawal of the Central Pacific timber lands of the Northwest, from the market. Most of this land is located in Southern Oregon.

The superior court of Washington has decided in favor of the mayor of Bremerton, the navy department and leading citizens of Bremerton, and against the saloonkeepers, and the saloons and joints there will be closed.

News has just reached Seattle of the grounding in Alaska on the 24th of July of Lou Whischer, August Reischel and Bert Ford, of Seattle, and of Henry and Paul Weidner, of Valdez, while crossing the Nazara river.

LIGHT AND POWER

ELECTRIC COMPANY WITH HEADQUARTERS AT WESTON

Organization Has \$50,000 Capital—Will Do a General Business That is Expected to Extend Over the Northern Part of the County—All Details of Construction and Field Have Been Mapped Out.

Articles of incorporation were filed in the office of the county clerk this morning incorporating the Emerald Electric Power & Light Company, with headquarters at Weston. The company is incorporated with a capital stock of \$50,000, divided into 500 shares of \$100 each, and its purpose is to furnish power and light for the city of Weston first, and if that is a paying investment, it is expected that the company will reach out into the surrounding country for the business of the little towns scattered throughout the county.

J. W. Young, Robert Jamison and J. E. Salling are the incorporators, and as they are careful and conservative men it is expected that they have deeply considered the move before it was made, and have calculated the chances for success. In this country there is certainly a demand for power, and if some corporation would convert the small amount of power in the river into a current that would serve all of the industries of the surrounding community, it would fill a hold of usefulness long vacant in the industrial conditions of the country. This is what the new corporation expects to do.

At first it will confine its energies to Weston, but as soon as it gets under headway it will begin to push out over the country and supply the power for concerns that are crippled in the dry season when the water is low, and those which would be here if they had the power to run.

For some time the surveyors of the company have been at work in the territory to be occupied by the company and the pipe lines and the power transmission lines have all been mapped out, so that the company is now in command of all the details of the construction and knows of the feasibility of the scheme. The work on the new plant will commence in a short time.

CHAUTAQUA CLOSES.

State Meeting a Brilliant Success in Every Way.

Oregon City, July 25.—Successful beyond all expectations was the tenth annual assembly of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua Association which concluded a 15 days' session at Gladstone Park last night.

The meeting this year was marked by an increased attendance over previous years and in interest exceeded possibly any other assembly in the history of the society. Of great educational and entertaining value was the program, which was without exception, the best and most instructive ever offered by the association.

The receipts for the 15 days have been beyond what the officers had hoped for, and will enable the cancellation of a small debt, the paying of all obligations of the society, and still leave a balance in the treasury for needed improvements on the grounds and to go toward preparing a program of equal merit and attractiveness for next year.

Financially the Chautauqua was a flattering success. Secretary Cross tonight stated that, in addition to defraying all of the expenses for this year's exercises and attractions and paying a debt of \$200 that remained from last year, there will remain in the treasury \$1,250. The aggregate receipts for the 15 days were \$5,000.

AMERICAN DENTISTS.

Examiners, Publishers and Operators in Session.

Asheville, N. C., July 25.—Prominent members of the dental profession, together with state dental examiners and publishers of papers in the interest of the profession, manufacturers of dental supplies and others, are here to a total of several hundred for the annual meeting of the National Dental Society. The sessions were formally opened today and will continue through the remainder of the week, being devoted to papers and discussions dealing with the latest discoveries and improvements in dentistry. Among those taking a prominent part in the proceedings is Contract Dental Surgeon William H. Chambers, U. S. A. detailed by the secretary of war as the representative of the dental corps of the army at the meeting.

USE PURE ICE INSTEAD.

SUPREME COURT WILL DECIDE.

Referendum Will Be Tried Out This Week and a Decision Reached.

The supreme court of Oregon will decide the fate of the referendum and initiative amendment this week, with Ralph Dunway, as defender and all the political wire-pullers of the state as prosecutors.

The report that Senator Mitchell would appear in defense of the measure seems to be erroneous, as the senator when speaking of the subject yesterday, says:

I really believe that the referendum is constitutional and that the circuit court has erred, but I have not heard anything of my taking an active part in the defense of the measure. It is possible, however, that I may prepare a supplemental brief and appear as a friend of the court, which is often done in such cases.
