

WORK ON THE FAIR

ALL RECORDS BROKEN AT THE ST. LOUIS GROUNDS.

Work is Being Hurried Now to Meet the Crying Need for Room—Exhibitors Will Soon Want Their Space Set Aside—The Agricultural Building is Now Under Way.

A record in the rapid construction of big exposition buildings is being made by the contractors who are putting up the mammoth palace of agriculture at the World's Fair at St. Louis.

The building when completed will be 546x1660 feet, and will cover more than 21 acres. On July 15, after 19 days' work, 1650 feet of the frame work of the giant structure had been finished and the work was progressing so satisfactorily that it was confidently predicted that the remainder would be completed in 12 days more.

Caldwell & Drake are the contractors. Though they were awarded the contract last March, much time was spent in buying materials and getting them on the ground so that they did not begin work until after the dedication on May 1. Then a small force began laying the floor.

When the real work began Mr. Caldwell, who personally directs the operations, put on 730 men, who work 10 hours a day. A night shift of 40 men is also employed. Work started on the north end. As soon as the frame work was finished on the north end the staff workers began their task and they are closely following the builders on the journey southward of 1660 feet.

Mr. Caldwell says that by December 1, when the building is due to be turned over to the exposition officials, the great building will be complete in every detail.

Although the agricultural palace is only one story high, and without galleries, the proportions are perfect and artistic. The great structure stands on Skinker Hill south of the administration building and overlooks the buildings of the main picture. Running the full length of the building is a great central aisle with the roof 100 feet above the floor. A clear story admits light to the central and contiguous aisles. The height of the eaves line is 65 feet. Messrs. Caldwell & Drake are also the contractors for the horticultural palace and work is progressing so satisfactorily on that building that its completion by December 1 is assured.

TENNESSEE TEACHERS.

Superintendents and Private Schools Discussed.

Monteagle, Tenn., July 29.—The second day of the annual assembly of the Tennessee State Teachers' Association was a busy one for the many delegates and visitors in attendance. At the forenoon session papers were presented and discussed as follows: "Proper Recitation Requirements," J. G. Rollow, Ringgold; "The Library as an Educational Agency," Louis Wilhoite, Shelbyville; "Relation of City and Rural School Systems," Superintendent J. W. Huey, Springfield.

This afternoon the assembly divided into conferences for the discussion of topics specially relating to the duties of superintendents and the functions of private schools. The session this evening promises to be one of the most interesting and instructive of the convention. The chief feature is to be the annual address of the president of the association, S. E. Hill, of Knoxville.

INDIANA ELKS.

Two Thousand Gathered Together at South Bend.

South Bend, Ind., July 29.—South Bend is festooned in purple and white in honor of the members of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, whose state convention will be in session here during the remainder of the week. Today was devoted to the reception of the visitors, who poured in on every train from Indianapolis, Fort Wayne, Terre Haute, Evansville, Anderson and numerous other cities and towns of Indiana. From present indications the attendance will reach 2,000, of whom about 200 will be regularly accredited delegates. The chief business sessions of the convention will be held tomorrow. The remainder of the time will be devoted largely to sightseeing and entertainment, elaborate arrangements having been made by the local lodge of the order to give the visitors a good time.

Good Roads Meeting at Canton.

Canton, O., July 29.—In connection with the home week celebration being held in Canton this week an interesting good roads meeting was held today. The participants included road superintendents from many parts of Ohio together with a number of road-making experts whose addresses and explanations were listened to with close attention by those present. The conference proved to be one of the most notable of its kind yet held in the state and the result promises to give a new impetus to the good roads movement in this section.

SOUTH HADLEY CELEBRATES.

Massachusetts Town is One Hundred Fifty Years Old.

South Hadley, Mass., July 29.—This picturesque old town, nestling at the base of Mt. Holyoke, today presented a livelier appearance than at any other time in its long history. The streets were filled with visitors, business houses and residences were decorated, and other outward evidences that something unusual was on the calendar were to be encountered at every turn. The occasion was the opening of a two days' celebration of the 150th anniversary of the founding of South Hadley, for which celebration the citizens have been preparing for more than a year past.

The celebration opened with the customary sunrise salute of cannon and later in the forenoon interesting literary exercises were held. The speakers of the day included Governor Bates, Congressman Frederick H. Gillett, Prof. E. G. Smith, of Beloit College, and Miss Mary E. Woolley, president of Mt. Holyoke College.

Though the celebration program includes speeches, fireworks, band concerts, athletic contests and other forms of entertainment the most interesting feature of the occasion, undoubtedly, is the reunion of former sons and daughters of the town. These are gathered to a total of several hundred from Ohio, Wisconsin, Illinois and a number of the states farther west.

THIRD ANNIVERSARY.

July 29, 1900, King Humbert of Italy Was Assassinated.

Rome, July 29.—The king and queen returned today from their summer villa near Turin and attended the exercises held in observance of the anniversary of the assassination of King Humbert, who was killed at Monza, July 29, 1900, by the anarchist, Gaetano Bresci. Commemorative services were held throughout Italy, though Rome was the center of the observances. It is estimated that 100,000 strangers visited the tomb of King Humbert in the Pantheon during the day. The pilgrimage to the Pantheon occurred at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

Owing to the unusual number of strangers now in Rome and the latent, though none the less deep political and religious feeling pervading all classes of society on account of the papal coronation, the government took extraordinary precautions to prevent any unseemly demonstrations. For the same reasons of state the memorial exercises were curtailed with a view to attracting less attention. The procession to the Pantheon was composed of delegations from all the Italian provinces. The pilgrims filed in procession past the vault containing the remains of King Humbert and there deposited a large number of wreaths.

RAILROAD TRAFFIC

GREAT VOLUME BUSINESS PROMISES FOR THIS YEAR.

General Conditions and Splendid Crops in Nearly Every Section Get the Credit—North, South, East and West All Share in the Prospects.

Chicago, Ill., July 28.—In the opinion of well-posted traffic officials all lines of business could not be in a much more healthy condition. Naturally, attention is concentrated upon western territory, particularly that in which the great crop-growing areas which serve as a guide for future business operations. Careful investigation has failed to disclose anything in the prospective conditions which would justify anxiety in New York's financial district. In the Northwest railroad men are equally optimistic and fully as confident that not only is the crop outlook encouraging, but the indications point to a greater volume of traffic for the railroads than was assured one year ago.

In the southwest traffic conditions are rapidly becoming such that officials say they have difficulty in handling it promptly and are looking for a car shortage earlier than usual, although they claim to be better prepared for tonnage than ever before. There is now a great volume of merchandise going to the recently flooded districts and the railroads touching those points are overburdened with traffic additional to that which has been pouring into other parts of the country for weeks. Officials of the lines directly west from Chicago say their reports from all distributing points could not be of a more encouraging nature.

The West is consuming an increasing tonnage of everything manufactured and vast quantities of supplies are moving forward now that were held back by the cold spell in June. The Southern lines also report a steadily increasing business in both directions and officials say they have few, if any, idle cars.
