AMERICAN FEDERATION OF SOCIETIES IS IN SESSION.

All the Leading Organizations of the Church Represented at Atlantic City—The Largest Delegation Came From Ohio—This is the Third Annual Convention.

Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 1.—The large and representative character of the attendance at the opening today of the third national convention of the American Federation of Catholic Societies was such as to give pleasure to Bishop McPaul, of Trenton, and the other eminent members of the church who have labored incessantly for several years to bring about a working union among the great Catholic organizations of America. When the convention was formally opened this morning there were present accredited delegates from state federations throughout the country, Ohio, where the movement has gained the strongest foothold, was represented by several hundred delegates, while Indiana, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and numerous other states had members in attendance. In addition to these delegations there were present more than two-score archbishops and bishops of the church and the representative character of the gathering was further accentuated by the presence of delegates from several Indian tribes and Porto Rican societies and from the Centro-Cattolico of the Philippines.

As a preliminary to the convention the delegates marched in a body to St. Nicholas church, where solemn pontifical services were held. Afterward the business sessions were begun in the Morris Guards armory, with President Thomas Minahan, of Columbus, O., presiding.

Over Twenty Orders Represented.

The roll call by Secretary Anthony Matre of Cincinnati, showed that delegates were in attendance representing the Catholic Order of Foresters, Ancient Order of Hibernians, Knights of Columbus, Catholic Knights of America, Catholic Mutual Benevolent Association, German Central Verein, Catholic Knights and Ladies of America, Knights of St. John, Young Men's Institute, National Total Abstinence Union, Young Men's Catholic Union, Catholic Benevolent Legion, Irish Catholic Benevolent Union, Knights of Father Matthew, Polish, French and Bohemian federations, the state federations of Ohio, Indiana, New Jersey, Kentucky, Vermont, Louisiana, Georgia, Tennessee, Pennsylvania and many other county federations, state leagues and other organizations scattered throughout the country.

Tomorrow there will be a grand pontifical mass in St. Nicholas church. Another feature will be solemn memorial services for the late pope, at which addresses will be delivered by a number of the highest prelates in the United States. The business sessions, which will continue until next Wednesday, will be devoted largely to discussions tending to strengthen the federation movement.

Prosecutor of Boodlers Campaigning in Missouri.

St. Louis, Aug. 1.—The active campaign of Circuit Attorney Joseph W. Folk, who has attained national prominence by his prosecution of alleged hoodlums, for the democratic nomination for governor of Missouri begins today at New Florence, Montgomery county, where he is scheduled to address an Old Settlers' reunion. Former Governor Lou V. Stephens has taken charge of Mr. Folk's campaign and has arranged to have the circuit attorney speak in the chief cities and towns of Northern Missouri during the next few weeks. Later the campaign south of the Missouri river will be taken up and Mr. Folk will be heard at Sedalia, Carthage, Springfield and other points.
