GENERAL NEWS.

Fifty latrones who were implicated in the recent raids near Surigao, in the province of Mindanao, P. I., have been sentenced to long terms of imprisonment.

A steel girder 32 feet in length, fell into the river at Ham's Fork Wyoming, Friday, throwing eight men into the water, killing one instantly and seriously injuring two more.

Conrad Schroeder, a Scranton millionaire, accidentally killed himself Friday, in changing his revolver from one pocket to another. It was exploded in some way killing him instantly.

The interstate commerce commission, on Friday, granted another extension of time to the railroads, in which they are to equip all cars and engines with safety appliances. The limit is now October 25.

C. E. Burns, a negro lawyer of Wheeling, W. Va., assaulted a white woman Friday morning, and is now in hiding. A posse is searching for him. He has always borne a good reputation and his act is a surprise to his friends white and black.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Last Chance saloon at Albany was robbed Friday of \$20.

Two attempts to burn Chinatown, in Fresno, Cal., were made Friday morning.

C. J. Burley, of Butte, one of W. A. Clark's trusted employes, has embezzled \$8,000 from the Montana Hardware Company.

Five young men from Seattle who attempted the ascent of Mount Rainier, were rescued by Professor Flett and party on Thursday evening, after being hopelessly lost.

The damage caused to crops in Colorado by the terrific hail storm Friday morning, is estimated at \$500,000. The greatest destruction was near Greeley and Fort Collins.

Governor Chamberlain has received an invitation to attend the Astoria regatta, accompanied by his staff as commander-in-chief of the Oregon National Guard. The governor has replied that he will attend if possible.

A. McWilliams and family, of Woodland, Wash., went to gather wild blackberries, for a short time Friday morning, and on returning to their home found a cougar in the house. A back door had been left open.

Fire in a home for aged women, in San Francisco, caused a panic, Friday. The inmates trampled each other in trying to escape. The fire did little damage, but many of the inmates are fatally injured by the panic.

The headless body found Friday in the Duwamish river, was today identified by the clothes as that of A. E. Levan, who disappeared in May. Levan is known to have had trouble with his neighbors in Sunnydale, where he had a ranch. He was once in court as defendant in an attempted murder case.

OREGON HISTORY

INTERESTING STATISTICS FROM OLD GEOGRAPHY.

School Book of 1835 Woefully Deficient in Correct Data—Four States Now Boast of Percentage of the Original Oregon.

A text book on geography, by Nathaniel G. Huntington, published at Hartford in 1835, has been kindly loaned by a Tacoma lady for examination, and proves exceedingly interesting, says the Salem Journal. At the time this geography was published there were 24 states in the Union, classified as the New England, or Eastern states; the Middle states; the Southern and the Western. Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama were the six Southern states and the eight states classified as "Western" were Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Missouri. There were three organized territories, Florida, Arkansas and Michigan, and two unorganized territories, Missouri and Oregon. Missouri territory was divided into four districts—Ozark, lying west of Arkansas; Osage, west of the state of Missouri; Sioux, north of Missouri and between the Mississippi and Missouri rivers, and Mandan, lying northwestward along the Missouri river, to its source. North of Illinois, west of Lake Michigan and east of the Mississippi was the district of Huron, still explored and inhabited chiefly by Indians.

Oregon an Empire in Extent.

The territory of Oregon is stated in this geography of 70 years ago to be 300,000 square miles in extent and to have a population of 80,000 Indians. "This territory extends west from the Rocky mountains to the Pacific ocean. It is a region but little explored by the whites. The climate is said to be milder than that of the same latitude on the Atlantic. The principal rivers are the Columbia and its branches. The soil on this river, for a great distance, is fertile, and abounds in fir trees and pines, some of which are represented to be 200 or 300 feet in height and 30 feet in circumference. The river produces vast quantities of salmon, which constitute no small part of the sustenance of the Indians on its banks. Eighteen miles above the mouth of the Columbia is Astoria, an American settlement of fur traders.

Abundance of Game.

"Beaver are found in plenty, producing large quantities of valuable fur. The noble and extensive forests of Oregon abound in the finest ship timber, and are thronged with wild animals. Thousands of buffalo have been seen within the compass of a mile. The wild horses are numerous, spirited and elegant. The Indians are fond of taking and mounting them. There are many sheep on all the mountains, and large numbers of horned cattle grazing on the hills toward the south."

This is all there was to learn 70 years ago about the Oregon territory out of which Oregon, Washington, Idaho and parts of Montana and Wyoming have been carved. It is noticeable that mildness of the climate was mentioned though as yet that fact is little understood in the East. No reference is made to any British possessions on the coast. The Russian possessions in America are bounded on the north by the Arctic ocean, east by Mackenzie's river and the Rocky mountains, south by Oregon territory and west by the Pacific ocean. The population is given at 1,000 whites and 50,000 Indians. The coast is said to be rugged and mountainous, resembling the coast of Norway. "It is diversified with lofty mountains, covered with perpetual snow, and deep chasms or cavities filled up with glaciers of ice. Mount Elias rises 18,000 feet or more than three miles in height, and is considered the highest peak in North America. The native Indians are said to resemble the Greenlanders, and are principally employed in hunting and fishing. The white population, in general, are Russian fur traders, who barter with the natives for furs and give in return tobacco, beads and other similar articles interesting to Indians.
