INTERESTING STATISTICS FROM OLD GEOGRAPHY.

School Book of 1835 Woefully Deicient in Correct Data-Four States Now Boast of Parentage of the Original Oregon.

text book on geography, by Nathanfel G. Huntington, published at Hartford in 1835, has been kindly oaned by a Tacoma lady for examination, and proves exceedingly teresting, says the Salem Journal, A: the time this geography was publish ed there were 24 state in the Union classified as the New England. Eastern states; the Middle states, the Southern and the Western, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama were the six Southern states and the eight classified as "Western" were Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Missouri There were three organized territories, Florida, Arkansas and Michigan, and two unorganized territories, Missouri and Oregon. Missouri territory was divided into four districts-Ozark, lying west of Arkansas Osage, west of the state of Missouri Sioux, north of Missouri and between Mississippi and Missouri dvers and Mandan, lying northwest-ward along the Missouri river, to its sources. North of Illinois, west of Lake Michigan and east of the Mississippi was the district of Huron, attle explored and inhabited chiefly dians.

Oregon an Empire in Extent.

The territory of Oregon is stated in this geography of 70 years ago to be 300,000 square miles in extrat and to have a population of 80,000 In-dians. This territory extends west from the Rocky mountains to the Pacific ocean. It is a region but little explored by the whites. The climate is said to be milder than that of the same lattitude on the Atlantic. The principal rivers are the Columbia and its branches. The soil on this river. for a great distance, is fertile, and abounds in fir trees and pines, some of which are represented to be 200 or 300 feet in height and 30 feet in circumference. The river produces vast quantities of salmon, which consti-tute no small part of the sustenance of the Indians on its banks. Eighteen mlies above the mouth of the Columbia is Astoria, an American settle-ment of fur traders.

Abundance of Game.

Beaver are found in plenty, producing large quantities of valuable fur. The noble and extensive forests of Oregon, abound in the finest ship timber, and are thronged with wild animals. Thousands of buffalo have been seen within the compass of a mile. The wild horses are numerous, spirited and elegant. The Indians are fond of taking and mount-ing them. There are many sheep on all the mountains, and large num-bers of horned cattle grazing on the hills toward the south.


