An Anecdote of Dumas.

Speaking of Alexander Dumas a writer says that his chief characteristic was his utter disregard of money. He made millions, but never had a franc at his command. "For example," said he, "upon one occasion Dumas had invited company to dinner and, finding that he did not stand possessed of a single cent, drove to a friend's and asked him to lend him two louis. This his friend readily did, and as Dumas was taking his leave suggested, as he had just been getting some fine pickles, he would be glad to give him a jar to add to his dinner. The servant was sent for the pickles and when he put the jar into the carriage, Dumas, having no other change about him dropped the two louis in the man's hand."

DENVER BABY BOASTS OF OLD SPANISH LINEAGE.

Descendant of One of the Discoverers of the American Continent—Belongs to Family of First White Man to Visit Colorado.

Denver has a baby who is the lineal descendant of one of the discoverers of America and the first white man to visit the territory embraced by the states of Colorado, Wyoming, Nevada and Montana and the territories of New Mexico and Arizona, says the Denver Post. He was born yesterday and he was immediately named for his illustrious ancestor, Alvar Nunez Cabeza de Baca.

Robed in filmy white muslins and laces, this little scion of a noble and adventurous race, is now lying at the home of his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Vincent M. Baca, 1456 Vine street, oblivious of the distinction as the only male child to be born to the Baca family in Denver.

"This child," said the father as he gently laid his hand on the head of the sleeping baby, "is the descendant of the man who, in the sixteenth century, led into this country that expedition the remains of which have been so recently discovered in some accidental excavations in Texas. I am certain that the remains were those of my ancestors' expedition, from the description of the papers and accoutrements which were found with the skeletons. They tally exactly with descriptions in the ancient histories of that ill-fated exploring party."

Wanderings of Vaca.

"It was in 1528 that Alvar Nunez Cabeza de Vaca—the name was originally Vaca, but has been corrupted into Baca in this country—set out from Spain with an exploring party of some 60 men and landed on the shores of Florida. He pushed inland and penetrated into the very heart of the country. The old histories tell of his having explored some great inland seas, and I have no doubt that he stood upon the very site of the city of Chicago. They speak also of his having seen a mighty river, and it is extremely likely that he was also on the ground of what is now St. Louis.

"From there he went south and west into Texas, and there, on the vast plains, he lost all but four of his men. With them he went into New Mexico, explored Colorado, and visited Montana, Wyoming and Nevada. In his reports he often speaks of Cerro Colorado, meaning the 'Red Peaks'; so it is not unlikely that he named this state, Montana and Nevada may have been named by him also, as he speaks of these countries in his reports by the name of 'Nieve,' meaning snowy, and 'Montana' full of mountains.

A Real American.

"After having made these extensive explorations of the new land, Vaca returned to Spain and gathering together his goods and family, closed up his affairs in the old world and came over here to live. He settled in New Mexico and the girl child that was soon afterwards born is usually spoken of as the first white child born in the new world. Vaca continued his explorations at intervals and pushed as far west as the Pacific, always, however, returning to New Mexico as his home. He died in Zuni, leaving a large family to carry on his name.

"There are, therefore, many Bacas in New Mexico, but this is the first of the line to be born in Colorado. Though he is the descendant of a Spanish grandee, he is a thorough American, because we consider that his ancestor was one of the very first Americans in the new land. We speak Spanish in our household, it is true, but it is because we wish to teach our children both tongues."

Vincent M. de Baca was born in New Mexico, but came to Denver to live four years ago and engaged in the real estate business.
