**GENERAL NEWS.**

The Typographical Union appropriated \$2,500 to be expended in organization in Philadelphia.

In Massachusetts the birth rate has fallen in 50 years from 28 to 25 per 1,000, and marriages from 23 to 17 per 1,000.

Much opposition to calling the extra session of congress for October is developing on account of the campaign then in progress for a large number of members.

The Colombian congress will discuss nine proposed amendments to the canal treaty. By a vote of 17 to 8 in the senate it was decided to debate in open session.

A grievance committee of the engineers and firemen of the Great Northern, is in session at St. Paul. It is expected that they will frame a demand for higher wages.

Edward Yockers, a Brooklyn switchman, became entangled in a broken trolley wire which held him fast for five minutes. The voltage was heavy, but he will recover.

The Union Veterans national encampment at Rochester, N. Y., yesterday passed resolutions strongly endorsing General Miles and commending his acts of administration.

Investigation discloses that F. J. Kohler, the missing treasurer of the City Trust & Banking Company, of Baltimore, loaned to himself \$154,000 of the company's funds. The firm was wrecked.

**NORTHWEST NEWS.**

A 10-ton ice plant and cold storage warehouse will be built at Oregon City this season.

C. Harrington, a farmer of Trent, Wash., was worked for \$2,300 by lunco men, Friday.

Howard Kressley, a bank clerk of Spokane, was arrested for forgery at Great Falls Mont., Friday.

E. A. McPherson, who has been first warden at the Salem penitentiary for a number of years, has resigned the position.

Edward Swanson, a cat repairer of Livingston, Mont., was instantly killed Friday, by being cut in twain by a moving train.

The dead body of an unknown man was found in the Columbia river, near Clifton, Friday. No clue to his identity has yet been found.

William D. English, one of the foremost democrats of California, died Friday at Oakland, as the result of an operation for appendicitis.

Although diligent search has been made, no trace of Mrs. Parikhurst and ex-convict Riley, who eloped from Portland, has yet been found.

The African Methodist church, of the Pacific Coast, which will hold an annual conference in Spokane, on August 19, will pass strong resolutions against mob law.

Solomon Baker, an inmate of St. Vincent's hospital, Portland, tried to commit suicide Friday by slashing his throat with a penknife on the street.

**WHEAT YIELD GOOD**

**ATHENA DISTRICT MAKES EXCELLENT SHOWING.**

Crops Averaging From 30 to 55 Bushels Per Acre—Harvesting Half Over—Yield Pp to That of Other Years.

The Athena Press reports the following excellent wheat yields from that vicinity. Harvesting is probably one-half done now and the crop promises to be as good as in other years.

W. H. Rosder's home place averaged 47 bushels per acre.

Moss Taylor had in a small acreage of barley—only 40 acres—but each and every acre produced 75 bushels.

From 220 acres John McIntyre has an average of 30 bushels.

W. R. Taylor's yield is 30 bushels to the acre.

A. L. Swagart's field north of town netted him 27 bushels to the acre.

The George Gross place of 375 acres, is reported to be good for 30 bushels to the acre. On this place a 12-foot header averaged 32 acres per day.

From 60 acres, T. J. Kirk threshed 1,480 sacks, averaging 57 bushels to the acre. From another 80, 1,188 sacks were threshed, or 35 bushels per acre.

Brown & Hodson, from 80 acres, produced 1,461 sacks, being 43 bushels per acre. Another field of 155 acres netted the firm 2,293 sacks, being an average of 50 bushels.

Duncan McIntyre got 3,112 sacks from 145 acres, the average being 50 bushels per acre and testing 64½ pounds to the bushel.

**SECURING EXHIBITS.**

Dr. Le Roy Finds Baker County People Ready to Respond to the Call for Advertising Matter.

Dr. A. Le Roy, representing the Oregon Information Bureau, is now in the Sumpter mining district, and from all reports from that section, is meeting with great success in gathering exhibits for the bureau.

At Baker City he was given a hearty reception by the city council and Commercial Association of the town, and was well rewarded for his visit to Eastern Oregon by the excellent agricultural and mining exhibits collected there.

The Sumpter mines people are preparing an elaborate exhibit which will be sent down later, which eclipses anything of the kind in the state. All the principal ore producers will be represented in the collection, and when placed on exhibition in the Union Depot at Portland, will fully represent the mineral wealth of that great district.

Dr. Le Roy expects to stop off at Pendleton on his return to Portland, if possible, to receive any collection of exhibits that may be brought to the city, while he is absent in Baker county. The Freewater fruit exhibit will be collected as the fruit season progresses and will not be ready to be placed in the rooms of the bureau before the first of October. It will include every variety grown in Umatilla county, and will be a luscious advertisement to present to the hungry home-seekers.

**CHILD'S JAW BROKEN.**

Athena Boy Meets With Serious Accident While at Play.

A young son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Sheard has met with a serious and painful accident, says the Athena Press. He was indulging in the fascinating sport of holding to rings and sliding down a rope, tied at an angle of about 30 degrees. The scene of the performance was in the Sheard barn, and a post to which one end of the rope was tied served as the stopping place in the descent.

Finally the boy missed the post with his feet and shot on out and down for a distance of 15 feet. He landed with his chin against a wagon rack. The force was such that his jaws were dislocated and one side fractured. It is a painful injury, but the little fellow, who is but 9 years of age, is getting on as well as possible under the circumstances.
