GRAND ARMY REPUBLIC NOW AT SAN FRANCISCO.

Ten Thousand Visitors Are Now in

the City and More Coming-Gen. Black Will Not Have a Walkaway for Commander-in-Chief-Expect to Have Over 20,000 Old Soldiers in Parade.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 15.---Visi-ors are poaring into San Francisco y hundreds preliminary to the openof the national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic and the annual meetings of the several affiliated organizations. Veterans who attended former national encamp-ments say they have seldom seen a targer attendance prior to the opening of the encampment week. All rail-ways have extra trains which are beavily loaded. Many of the big dele-gations from the East and Middle West will not put in an appearance until tempow, having stopped at in-termediate points for the purpose of sightseeing. It is estimated, however, that nearly 10,000 visitors are already here, and throughout the day the California posts have been husy es-corting visiting comrades from the stations to their headquarters.

The decorations may have been richer in triumphal arches and other designs at one or two other encamp-ments, but at none was a city more profusely or generally decorated with American flags than is San Francisco On every hand may be seen a oday. bewildering array of bunting, flags and streamers, until the eye is sated with the varied display. Not only business streets and the houses are on the line of parade decorated, but in all parts of the city, even in the suburbs and across the bay, may be seen beautiful evidence of the patriotism of the citizens.






