AT ST. LOUIS FAIR

SUPERINTENDENT WEHRUNG
WILL APPLY FOR SPACE.

Flag Pole Made From an Oregon Tree
450 High to Be Presented to the Fair—Mr. Wehrung Will Visit St. Louis in October.

Portland, Aug. 18.—General Superintendent Wehrung and his assistants in charge of the work of gathering the exhibit for the St. Louis Fair, decided yesterday to apply for space as follows:

Fish and game, 6,000 square feet; forestry, 7,500 square feet; agriculture, 12,000 square feet; education, 4,000 square feet; horticulture, 3,000 square feet.

This space may not be used, but it was the opinion of Mr. Wehrung and his assistants that an application should be made immediately in order that the room may be held for Oregon. When Mr. Wehrung visits St. Louis next October, he will be able to make definite arrangements for space. It may be by that time the commissioners will find it impossible to get along with any less than will be asked. In any event, no more is expected to prove necessary.

The superintendent and his assistants expect to be able to gather a large part of the Oregon exhibit from the county and district fairs to be held this year. It has been already decided that the best exhibits made at these displays should be purchased and a fund has been set aside for the purpose.

Mr. Wehrung, President Myers and the committees interested in the fair will make the selections while the fairs are in progress during the coming month, and in the meantime the work of the assistant superintendents will not be very heavy. They are expected to supplement the displays gathered from all parts of the state by the commission's plan, and will not do much work in the field until it is known what can be obtained from local fairs.

The conference of the superintendent with his assistants yesterday resulted in a thorough understanding of the scope of work to be undertaken, and a decision that it would not be necessary at present to inaugurate active field work.

The state commission has decided to offer a tree 430 feet in length to the officials of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition for use as a flag pole, and a letter conveying the tender has been sent to President Francis.

The commission believes that this tree, standing on the fair grounds would serve as an unusually good advertisement of Oregon's lumber resources. It will probably be impossible to ship the tree to St. Louis without cutting it in two, but it could easily be spliced again.

NEW CHINESE RULES

COMMISSIONER OF IMMIGRATION DEFINES ELIGIBLES.

Bertillon System of Measurements to Be Put Into Execution—Sixty-One Rules Adopted by Commission—Many Changes Made in Old Rules.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 18.—A new set of Chinese regulations, prepared by Commissioner General of Immigration Sargent and approved by Secretary Cortelyou, of the department of commerce and labor, jurisdiction of the matter of the exclusion of Chinese having been transferred from the treasury to the latter department, were made public today and are now ready for distribution.

These rules designate what Chinese persons are permitted to land at ports of the United States under the provisions of the laws and treaties, together with the ports at which Chinese, other than Chinese diplomatic and consular officers, may land, and name the officers who have been vested with the power and authority heretofore conferred on collectors of customs, giving their stations and jurisdiction.

Conditions are named to which every Chinese person seeking admission into the United States under the provisions of the act of 1902, for the purpose of taking part in any fair or exhibition authorized by congress, shall conform as a condition precedent to such admission regulations governing the arrest and deportation of Chinese unlawfully within the United States are included.

All told there are 61 rules embraced in the new regulations. Accompanying the regulations are laws and treaties relating to the exclusion of Chinese.

Provision is made for a Bertillon record of all Chinese laborers arriving and departing at ports of entry, copies of such registry to be transmitted to the commissioner general of immigration.

Conditions are prescribed to which all Chinese persons claiming the right of transit through the United States to foreign territory must conform as a condition precedent such privilege.

Numerous changes have been necessary in the revision of these rules to make them conform to the transfer of jurisdiction over the subject from the treasury department to the department of commerce and labor. Forms of blanks are prescribed and rules made to govern the officers charged with the enforcement of the exclusion law.

The highest average yield was 961 pounds per acre, harvested in the united province of Agra-Oudh.

Receipts of Jeffries-Corbett Fight.
