## STOCKMEN MEET

WILL ASK LEWIS AND CLARK FAIR BOARD FOR \$100,000.

Committee Appointed to Present the Claims of Oregon Stockmen—Live-stock Exhibit to Follow Dairy Test in October, 1905.

George Chandler, of Baker City, member of the state board of agriculture, and one of the most prominent stockmen in Eastern Oregon, passed through yesterday evening en route home from a meeting of prominent stockgrowers of the Northwest, which was held in Portland last Saturday evening.

The meeting was called for the purpose of presenting the claims of the livestock industry of the Northwest to the Lewis and Clark Fair commission, for appropriations and space.

Among the Oregon stockmen who attended the meeting were: J. M. Atkinson, Newburg; Thomas Withycombe, Farmington; C. D. Minton, Salem; E. H. Looney, Jefferson; A. Chalmers, Centerville; Joseph Withycombe, state agricultural college, Corvallis; M. D. Wisdom, Portland; N. C. Maris, Hot Lake; P. A. Frakes, M. Collins and Harry West, Scappoose; George Chandler, Baker City; George Grammie, North Yamhill; C. M. Cartwright, Portland; J. P. Van Houten, Hay Creek; C. A. Westgate, Albany; J. M. Flaherty, Plainview; K. Schmitz, Shubel; Ed Shull, Albany; R. Scott, Milwaukie.

It was unanimously decided by the meeting to ask the officials of the Lewis and Clark Fair for an appropriation of \$100,000 to defray the expenses of an exhibit of stock and a working dairy test at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. A committee representing the stockmen will represent the request to the board of directors and the state commission.

This committee is composed of the following men: Robert Scott, Oswego; Thomas Withycombe, G. W. Chamberlain, C. M. Cartwright, A. J. Splawn, of North Yakima, and J. L. Smith, of Spokane.

It is the intention of the fair commissioners to hold the livestock show during the first two weeks of October, 1905, following the dairy test. This arrangement has been suggested in order that the stock brought to Portland to enter the dairy contest may immediately enter the general livestock exhibit, without delay and expense.

A division of the fund asked for by the stockmen is suggested as follows: Horses, \$20,500; beef cattle, \$15,000; dairy breeds, \$15,500; sheep, \$12,500; dairy test, \$15,000; goats, \$1,500; swine, \$7,500; poultry, \$5,000; dogs, \$2,000; miscellaneous, \$5,000.

It is expected that stockmen all through the Northwest will use their influence with the fair board to secure this amount for a fair presentation of the industry. Space and accommodations will be plentifully supplied for all exhibits.

### Snyder-Willis.

## NATIONAL COUNCIL

MRS. VAN ORSDALL HAS STARTED TO MILWAUKEE.

All the Leading Fraternal Benefit Orders of the United States Will Be Represented—The Pendleton Delegation Will Try to Have the Next Session Held at Portland.

Mrs. C. C. Van Orsdall, accompanied by a stenographer, leaves on No. 2 this evening for Leadville, en route to Milwaukee. In Colorado she will be joined by Grand Clerk Griffith, Past Guardian May Falkenburg, Head Consul Falkenburg, and other delegates to the National Fraternal Congress, which convenes in Milwaukee on the 25th.

The congress is composed of the leading fraternal benefit orders of the United States, and meets annually to discuss and exchange views on matters pertaining to fraternal life insurance. In addition to the main body there are subdivisions—the medical section, law section and press section. Mrs. Van Orsdall, in addition to representing the Women of Woodcraft in the main body, is a delegate of the press section as editor of the order's official paper, and a member of one of the important committees.

A movement is on foot to elect Head Consul Falkenburg vice-president of the congress, which would carry with it by unwritten law election to the presidency next session, an honor highly esteemed in the fraternal world.

"We also hope to do some missionary work for Portland as the meeting place for 1905," said Mrs. Van Orsdall.

Returning, Mrs. Van Orsdall will spend a week in the grand clerk's office in Leadville, looking after some detail work preliminary to the opening of the fall work.
