RANGE DRYING UP PAST WEEK HAS BEEN VERY HARD ON GRASS.

Harvest Under Way All Over Eastern Oregon—Yield Much Better Than Expected—Hops Infected With Lice—Prunes Not Falling so Badly as Usual.

A few small showers occurred Sunday in the Willamette valley, but otherwise the past week has been dry, with temperatures averaging slightly above normal. The rains were insufficient to be of much benefit to late crops and pastures, which are now beginning to need rain quite badly. Feed is getting short on the ranges, and the supply of milk is decreasing in the dairy districts.

Prunes are not dropping so badly as they did during the previous week, and this crop will be an extra good one. Bartlett pears are also very promising. Apples are quite uneven, and it is expected the yield will be less than the average. Columbia River Valley. Condon, Gilliam county, F. B. Stevens.—Weather moderately warm; harvest progressing rapidly; threshing just commenced, will start to threshing generally next week.

Sinnahso, Wasco county, J. O. Ashenburt.—Exceedingly dry; pastures drying up; hay and grain nearly all harvested; good crops. Ridgeway, Wasco county, M. U'Ren.—Weather very warm and sultry; Saturday was, however, cloudy and cooler; the second crop of alfalfa is nearly all put up; gardens doing well, but late.

Dufur, Wasco county, Alex. Strachan.—Week very favorable for all kinds of farm work; fore part of week hot and clear, turning somewhat cooler, with considerable wind from northwest towards the close; heading is almost finished and a good deal of threshing done; grain turning out splendidly and of good quality.

Weston, Umatilla county, Maud M. Baker.—Harvest nearly ended in this vicinity; teams busy hauling wheat to warehouse; finest quality of grain and good average crop; barley all cut and hay baled in the mountain districts; hay about half an average crop, but of splendid quality; barley yield exceptionally good; plenty of fruit, though dropping from the trees is complained of; warm and clear weather.

Plateau Region. Post, Crook county, J. B. Meyer.—Haying nearly done; second crop of alfalfa is doing well; garden truck growing nicely; hay crop averages shorter than last year; range very dry and feed scarce; apples will be a good crop; potatoes are affected with scale to some extent.

Owyhee, Malheur county, J. M. Harris.—An excellent second crop of alfalfa is now being harvested, bean crops are looking fine and promise good yields; potatoes are good. Lakeview, Lake county, W. E. Wheeler.—Haying about completed; an average crop has been secured in good shape; grain harvest just commenced; barley a little above the average, heads well filled and berry plump; wheat will be below the average in quantity, but the quality is good.
