

STRONG IN GRAIN MARKET.

Livestock Market is Weaker and Marked by Several Pronounced Declines-The Green Grocers' Stuff is All Cheaper Than a Week Ago-A Few Staples Have Appreciated in Price.

The local market is shifting but in ittle things. One or two of the staple articles have jumped up a notch or two, but the rise has been little and usually comes at this time of the year. On the other hand, most of the green things in the market have taken a tumble since this time last week and altogether the scale is more to the liking of the housewife than it has

The biggest change in the list is in the livestock scale, and the buttom seems to be loose in this part of the Cows have dropped from \$3 per hundred to \$2.65 and \$2.75, and steers have gone from \$2.60 to \$2.30. This is the lowest price that has held in the stock market for some time. and those who are dealing in that part of the business say that the low est price has not as yet been reached.

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
