Immense rich gold mines have been discovered in Peru, S. A. Fires in the Shoestring oil fields of Texas have done \$1,500,000 damage during the past 10 days. The Los Angeles club of the Pacific National League of baseball clubs, has received orders to disband. The Federal Mining & Smelting Company, of New York, has increased its capital to \$30,000,000. Its original capital was \$2,000,000. All the mills of the American Sheet Steel Company, in Pennsylvania, are to be unionized. The company has 164 mills, of which 98 have been unionized up to this time.

NORTHWEST NEWS

Lars Anderson, a pioneer of Oregon City, died Friday, aged 70 years. William Kleeman, of Portland, was drowned at Newport, Friday, while surf bathing. John Walton, of Salem, died at his home Friday evening, of heart disease, aged 78 years. The O. R. & N. steamer, Indravelle, arrived in Portland Friday, with an Oriental cargo of 2,900 tons. Ray Peters, of Coburg, near Eugene, was sent to the asylum Friday, having gone insane from reading novels. Frederick Knapp, a prominent farmer of North Yamhill, was drowned in a mill dam, near that city, Friday evening. The war department will order coal for use at Vancouver barracks the coming winter, instead of wood. The price of wood is almost prohibitive. Harvey Caldwell, a highly respected young farmer of Albany, was killed Thursday by the arm of a horse-power striking him in the stomach. John Hamaker, M. F. Hedrick and a man named Coburn, were instantly killed by the explosion of a logging engine boiler, at Chehalis, Wash., Friday. Henry Weichardt, the millionaire brewer of Portland, has begun the construction of a seven-story building at the corner of Fourth and Pine streets in that city.

ZIONISTS AT BASLE.

Will Consider Colonization of the Holy Land.

Basle, Aug. 22.—Representatives of the United States, Great Britain, Germany, France, Austria and other countries have gathered here for the sixth Zionist congress, which is to begin its sessions tomorrow. The congress this year promises to be the most important ever held in view of the late Kishinev outrages and the political situation in Eastern Europe. There seems excellent reason for believing that the Zionist leaders are preparing to take full advantage of the situation developed through the Macedonian uprising.

One of the principal discussions of the congress will be the colonization of a province of Wadd-Ausch in Palestine. It is a protectorate of Great Britain, where it is proposed to settle 100,000 Jews. Negotiations have already been opened with the British government.

Missionary Alliance Meeting.

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 22.—The fifth annual Southern convention of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, began today at the Piedmont Park auditorium and will continue for a period of eight days. Nearly every Southern State is represented at the gathering and the speakers will include a number of eminent divines. Besides the sermons and addresses the program is to include musical features of a high class.

OIL BORING HAS STOPPED.

Lack of Capital Has Temporarily Queighed a Boom.

A prominent prospector of Baker City is authority for the statement that boring for oil has been temporarily suspended in Oregon, not through lack of indications of the fluid, but through lack of capital.

Oil experts agree that a deposit of petroleum underlies the rich farming lands of the Willamette valley, and in the Malheur, and that it can be struck at comparatively short distances from the surface, but thus far there has not been over \$5,000 spent in any one prospect.

At Newberg the drills reached a depth of 1,200 feet, with excellent indications, when the money gave out and the workers quit. At Monmouth oil was actually struck at 1,000 feet, when the stockholders concluded to shut down for a while.

In Lincoln county the drills had not reached a depth of 800 feet when operations were suspended, and at Vale, in Eastern Oregon, it was thought a few feet more would find the oil when the men were ordered to drop their tools for the time being. Drillers are now at work on the bank of the Willamette river below St. Johns, with good prospects, and it is probable the work will be presented until the contention of the oil experts has been verified.

Were capital to flow into Oregon for the purpose of drilling wells, as it has into Kentucky and Texas, it is likely that more than one oil well would be spouting long ere this. The experts who have looked over the field aver that the quality of Oregon oil is superior to that of the South.
