THE ALASKAN TRADE

NEARLY FIVE MILLIONS IN GOLD IN PAST YEAR.

Grand Total of Trade for the Year \$41,881,323—Greatest Amount of Alaskan Traffic Passes Through Seattle—Salmon Trade in the Lead.

Returns from the bureau of statistics show that Alaska enjoyed a grand total of \$41,881,323 in commerce for the fiscal year 1903. A general summary of the Alaska trade for the year ended June 30, is as follows: Merchandise shipped from the United States to Alaska, \$9,266,504; merchandise shipped from Alaska to the United States, \$10,188,220; gold and silver from the United States to Alaska, \$104,359; gold and silver from Alaska to the United States, \$4,754,578; shipments of foreign gold and silver from the United States to Alaska, \$33,158; shipments of foreign gold and silver from Alaska to the United States, \$10,779,567; shipments of foreign merchandise from Alaska to the United States, \$39,848; domestic exports of Alaska, \$1,588,633; foreign exports of Alaska, \$23,495; imports of Alaska, \$477,463.

Of the merchandise shipped from the United States to Alaska during the last fiscal year, \$6,138,039 went through the Puget sound customs district, \$2,955,241 through San Francisco and \$173,124 through Oregon. Something like the same ratio existed probably in the shipments of Alaska products to the United States, although the government record gives no enlightenment on this point.

The product of Alaska of greatest value last year was, of course, salmon. The canned salmon shipments from the territory to the United States aggregated \$8,410,981. All the other fish products of the territory amounted to about \$770,000. Some of the other principal items were: Copper, \$100,599; fertilizers, \$16,828; furs and fur skins, \$422,606; iron and steel and manufactures thereof, \$100,781; animal oils, \$29,311; whalebone, \$115,994; manufactures of wood, \$35,740; manufactures of wool, \$22,580; other articles but not all other articles, \$122,809. Besides this merchandise, gold and silver to the value of \$4,754,578 were shipped from Alaska to the United States. This gold and silver was produced in the territory. Besides this, there were shipments of foreign gold and silver from Alaska amounting to \$10,979,567.

A great variety of articles composed the shipments from the United States to Alaska. The aggregate, not including gold and silver, was \$9,266,504, distributed chiefly as follows: Animals, \$206,442; breadstuffs, \$376,196; drugs and chemicals, \$124,907; coal, \$256,117; coffee, \$43,951; manufactures of cotton, \$188,882; eggs, \$159,269; fish products, \$42,678; fruits and nuts, \$234,158; glass and glassware, \$35,080; gunpowder and other explosives, \$278,264; hay, \$106,262; manufactures of rubber, \$135,982; iron and steel and manufactures thereof, \$2,311,678; leather and manufactures, \$106,501; oils, \$168,650; provisions, including meats and dairy products, \$969,773; salt, \$58,551; malt liquors, \$103,119; spirits, \$236,607; wines, \$21,231; sugar, molasses and confectionery, \$155,253; manufactures of tin, \$429,316; tobacco, \$311,446; vegetables, \$265,542; manufactures of wood, \$692,814; manufactures of wool, \$348,558.

Inland Lakes Regatta.

Oshkosh, Wis., Aug. 24.—The week of the annual regatta of the Inland Lakes Yachting Association has arrived and Lake Winnebago is dotted with more fleet craft than ever before in its history. Several hundred craft yachts are here as representatives of the various clubs belonging to the association which embraces in its membership the states of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and Iowa. The Oshkosh Yacht Club has made preparations on an elaborate scale for the entertainment of the visiting yachtsmen and the week promises to be a gala one for the lovers of aquatic sports.

Spanish War Veterans.

Rochester, N. Y., Aug. 24.—Young men of military bearing and garbed in khaki uniforms are much in evidence about the streets and public places of Rochester today. They are the delegates to the annual state reunion of Spanish-American war veterans, which was formally opened today. The reunion is to last until Thursday and the program arranged for the gathering is an interesting one. Campfires are to be held each evening with addresses by speakers of note.
