

THE ALASKAN TRADE

NEARLY FIVE MILLIONS IN GOLD IN PAST YEAR.

Grand Total of Trade for the Year \$41,881,323-Greatest Amount of Alaskan Traffic Passes Through Seattle-Salmon Trade in the Lead.

Returns from the bureau of statistics show that Alaska enjoyed a grand total of \$41,884,323 in com-merce for the fiscal year 1903. A gen-eral summary of the Alaska trade for the year ended June 30, is as fol-lows: Merchandise shipped from the lows: Merchandise shipped from the United States to Alaska \$9,266,504; merchandise shipped from Alaska to the United States \$10,188,220; gold and silver from the United States to Alaska, \$104,359; gold and silver Alaska, \$104,359; gold and silver from Alaska to the United States, \$4. 754,578, shipments of foreign gold and silver from the United States to and silver from the United States to Alaska, \$33,159; shipments of foreign gold and silver from Alaska to the United States, \$10,779,567; shipments of foreign merchandise from Alaska to the United States, \$23,849; domes-tic exports of Alaska, \$1,588,623; for-elgn exports of Alaska, \$23,495; im-

Of the merchandlise shipped from the United States to Alaska during the last fiscal year, \$6,138.039 went through the Paget sound customs dis-trict, \$2,955,341 through San Francis-co and \$173,124 through Oregon. Something like the same ratio exist-ed probably in the shipments of Alas-ka products to the United States al-though the government record gives though the government record gives no enlightenment on this point The product of Alaska of greatest

value last year was of course, sal-mon The cannod salmon shipments from the territory to the United States aggregated \$8.410.501 All the other fish products of the territory amounted to about \$770,000. Some of the other principal items were: Cop-per \$100,595; fertilizers, \$16,828; furs and fur skins, \$422,606; from and steel and manufactures thereof, \$100,781 animal ods, \$29,311; wimlebone, \$115 an marines \$22,5311; with each \$1,57,40; manufactures of wood \$25,550 other articles but not all other articles \$122,509 Desides this merchandise; old and sliver to the value of \$4, 54,578 were shipped from Alaska to he United States. This gold and sil-set was produced in the territory Be-ides this, there were shipments of oreign gold and silver from Alaska unoninting to \$16,979,567.

A great variety of articles com-osed the shipments from the United States to Alaska.
