MILL OVERHAULED

PENDLETON WOOLEN MILLS
THOROUGHLY REPAIRED.

Many Important Changes in the Interior—Stone Building on Alta Street Has Been Leased and Will Be Used as a Stock Room.

Superintendent Charles J. Ferguson, of the woolen mills, is having some important changes made in the arrangement of the mills and the disposition of the materials and machinery. For some time it has been felt by the management that there would soon have to be some change in the arrangement of the departments for the reason that the mill was becoming so crowded with machinery that there was no room to move about. The finishing department has been in the main room of the mill where the looms are, and things were pretty badly mixed up.

In order to give more room in the mill and also to decrease the amount of insurance necessary to carry on the structure, it was decided to move the stock room, and with this end in view the basement of the Byers' warehouse, a large stone structure on Alta street, has been leased by the management and will be used as the stock room and shipping department for the institution. All of the stock will be taken there as fast as finished, and will from there be made up for shipment. There the samples will be kept, and in fact, all of the sales department will be located there.

The old stock room will be used and equipped as the trimming, binding, fringing, brushing and folding department, and will be fitted up as such at once. In one end of this room will be placed a large table and lockers for the use and convenience of the employees who bring their lunch with them. In the lockers will be room for any little thing that the person may want to put they will have use for.

The former office of the superintendent will be fitted as the office of the designer and will open into the new office of the superintendent, which will be placed on the inclosed porch on the east side of the building. This porch will be ceiled and floored and papered, making room for the superintendent and his stenographer, and all of the records of his office.

The machinery of the mills has all been gone over and cleaned and repaired, and will be in the best possible shape when the time comes for the mills to open. Next week all of the cards will be reclothed at a cost of over \$200, and when that is done about all of the repairs will be finished.

With the exception of perhaps a dozen, all of the mill hands have been away since the mills closed, at the coast and the mountains and springs, and will return to their work refreshed and in good condition for the long run of the winter and spring. With the increase in the room and the better ordering of the work that can be done as a result, the looms will be able to weave faster, and the hands will therefore make more for their time, as they all work by the piece.

HIGH-CLASS EXHIBITION.

Next Friday Night a Match Between Famous Wrestlers.

Frank S. Lewis, of Pendleton, and Chris Person, of San Francisco, will meet in the opera house on the evening of Friday next, to decide which one of the two men is the bigger and the stronger by a wrestling bout. Both of the men are well known in the athletic world, and both have records on the mat that each will strive to uphold, and as a result the meeting will be full of interest and excitement.

Person was for a long time the Pacific Coast champion, and for three years held the same honor in the Klondike. He is a man that weighs in for his contests at 196 pounds, and is one of the prettiest men physically that ever stepped onto a mat. Lewis is well known in this city, where he met the "Terrible Turk" and gave him all of the excitement he wanted for an evening's entertainment.

He weighs in at 180 pounds, and is one of the cleverest wrestlers in the business today. He has, during his career, met 100 men and thrown most of them. He held the middle-weight championship until he outgrew the weight and was never beaten by a man of his class while he held the honor.

The go next Friday will be for a side purse of \$100 and will be a good exhibition, as the men have met before and each knows the work of the other, so that it will be a battle royal.
