GENERAL NEWS.

Rumors are again in circulation of the possible abdication of Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria.

The embargo on the exportation of arms and ammunition from Germany to China has been removed.

Vagnato Felipo and Filippo Nero quarreled at the Bronx, N. Y., over a debt, and at a distance of 10 paces each fired six revolver shots at the other. Every shot hit. Both are in hospital.

John Foley is dead in New York, aged 69 years. He was the instigator and mainstay of the famous Tweed investigation, and all his life was engaged in similar works of reform in New York City. He was an Irishman by birth.

Colonel John T. Bowden of Plainfield, N. J., disappeared two years ago in the interior of the Philippines and nothing was heard of him until a short time ago. He was supposed to be dead, but on the contrary, voluntarily exiled himself.

Statistics from the records of the English army recruits show for the past 15 years a steady though slight retrogression in the height, chest measurements and weight of volunteers for the military services. It is thought to indicate a general and national deterioration of the nation physically.

San Francisco sporting and society circles are all swelled up over the announcement by Robert de Rothschild that San Francisco is as spicy and entertaining as Paris. Rothschild is in Frisco from the west, on his way to London. He is out on a get-around with \$50,000 spending money per year.

Hop picking on the earlier varieties has already begun in the vicinity of Independence, and the regular season will begin about September 5.

The British steamer Agnes Oswald, left Portland Monday, bound for Cape Town, loaded with 1,170,294 feet of lumber and a mixed cargo of merchandise.

It is impossible to identify the tramp who committed suicide at Tucker, Wash., Monday, by laying his head on the rail in front of a moving train. His face is crushed beyond recognition.

Father Cornelius, one of the founders of St. Martin's College, at Woodland, five miles from Olympia, has just completed the celebration of the golden anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood.

Mrs. A. L. Petrie, of Portland, killed a half-grown cougar near Lebanon, Sunday, with rocks. She was attacked by the beast, and having stunned it with a blow, she kept up a fusillade of rocks upon its head until she killed it.

W. R. Stansell will build a sawmill at Jacksonville, this season, with a capacity of 60,000 feet per day. He has purchased a magnificent body of timber land in the vicinity of the city and will probably build a log road to it.

Athena, Ore., Aug. 25.—C. O. Bowman barely escaped losing his life last week. On his return from Weston to Milton, while crossing the railroad track, his team became frightened and ran over an embankment, turning the wagon over, killing one of the horses and giving Mr. Bowman a very narrow escape. Mr. Bowman was seriously injured.

DISSATISFIED WITH HOME.

Orting Institution Has Complaints Made About It.

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 25.—Charles Math, an inmate of the Soldiers' Home at Orting, appeared before the state board of control in this city this week and preferred complaints against the management of the Orting institution. His special complaint is directed at Superintendent Kauffman, who has charge of the institution, and who, Mr. Math alleges, called him names and ordered him to work when he was not physically able to do so.

The board has agreed to investigate the charges when it visits the institution in October.

BLACK TONGUE IN VALLEY.

Has Appeared Among Cattle in Lane County.

Eugene, Ore., Aug. 25.—Black tongue, the disease which was reported a few weeks ago as troubling the cattle of the South Willamette valley, has made its appearance in Lane county and considerable concern is felt over the same, as Lane county possesses not only some of the finest stock in the state, but a large number of heads. A spread of the disease would cause serious damage.
