REMODELING PLANT

THE COURTHOUSE HEATING
PLANT BEING OVERHAULED.

Walla Walla Firm Doing the Work
—Old Plant Never Gave Satisfac-
tion—Changes Will Result in a
Great Saving of Fuel.

C. Joy and several assistants, are
busy at the courthouse remodeling
the heating system. The men are
the representatives of the George H.
Sutherland Company, of Walla
Walla, and have just finished the
work at the Hotel Pendleton, where
they have been engaged for some
time in putting in a new steam plant
and pipes for the heating of that
hotel.

The heating plant at the court-
house has never given satisfaction
since it was installed, and has been
more of a nuisance than a benefit,
for the reason that only one or two
of the rooms in the house could be
warmed by the furnace. It has been
found necessary to remodel the
whole system in order to get any
work out of the plant, for the old
system is so constructed that it can-
not be changed in part. It is now
the intention of those who have the
oversight of the change, to see
that it is thorough, and that when
it is done the house can be warmed
from top to bottom.

The changes will cost several
hundred dollars, but will pay for
themselves in a short time, for it is
much cheaper to heat the building
with one big fire in the basement
furnace than with a small fire in
every room in the house.
