HARVEST HALF DONE

RAINS STOP OPERATIONS FOR A FEW DAYS.

Sugar Beet Crop Needs More Rain—Hay Was Very Light—Wheat Yields Are Higher Than Expected—Corn Growing Nicely.

The first half of the week was warm and dry in all sections, while the latter part was cool everywhere, with good rains west of the Cascade mountains, but with none of consequence in the eastern part of the state. The rains did no damage to grain in shock, and they were of great benefit to pastures, clover, corn, late potatoes and gardens. The cloudiness was unfavorable for hops, as it caused an increase of vermin and mould, but as yet the yards have not been damaged to any great extent and the prospect is favorable for a good crop of hops. Picking will become general in a couple of weeks, and the growers are now engaging hands for this work.

The grain harvest is drawing to a close and threshing is now well advanced. Wheat and barley yields are above the average in the Willamette valley, and oats are a splendid crop. East of the Cascade mountains wheat, barley and oats are yielding well, but falling below last year's returns. The quality of all small grain is better than last year.

Sugar beets, where well cultivated, are doing finely, but this crop needs more rain. Corn has made excellent advancement during the week. Considerable complaint is made of blight affecting the late potatoes in Tillamook and Clatsop counties, but elsewhere they are doing nicely. Prunes have not altogether ceased dropping, but many trees have all they can carry, and the crop, as a whole, will be a big one. Apples are doing well, and Bartlett pears give promise of large returns.

Columbia River Valley. Ridgeway, Wasco county, M. O'Ren.—Weather very warm, with light showers the latter part of week; prunes and plums beginning to ripen; tomato plants and cucumber vines are becoming badly blighted.

Condon, Gilliam county, P. B. Stevens.—Weather warm and fine for harvesting, and good headway is being made; heading just about finished and threshing in progress; yield so far not quite so good as last year.

Hadman, Morrow county, A. B. Stanley.—Weather very favorable for crops; harvesting in progress; some threshing being done; gardens doing finely.

Duncan, Umatilla county, E. S. Wilbur.—Hot and dry; fire destroying considerable range, grasshoppers unusually numerous.

Pendleton, Umatilla county, H. J. Taylor.—Weather was hot and dry the last week, but is clouding up now; harvest is over; the yield is not up to the average, but the quality is No. 1; little wheat hauled to warehouses as yet.

Plateau Region. Island City, Union county, J. M. McCall.—Weather dry and hot, with cool nights; heading is well along and threshing is being pushed; fall wheat is yielding better than expected; quality good; early potatoes good, late ones poor; fruit good; gardens drying up; sugar beets, where watered, looking well; where not watered, only fair.

Burns, Harney county, F. H. Howell.—Weather warm; oats, rye and barley ripening very fast; meadows drying up rapidly; potato crop still promises to yield well.

Clarno, Wheeler county, I. H. Hale.—Very hot and dry during the day, cool at night; grass drying up on the range; stock looking very well.

Post, Crook county, J. B. Meyer.—Week very warm in day time, with high wind in the afternoon, mornings getting cool; second crop of alfalfa doing well; seed rye short; grass on range very short; stock looking quite well.

Soldiers From Louisiana Who Wore the Gray. Alexandria, La., Aug. 26.—Alexandria gave royal welcome today to the scores of visitors here from all parts of the state for the annual convention of the Louisiana Division, United Confederate Veterans. The crowds have been greatly augmented by the presence of delegates to the annual state conventions of the Sons of Veterans, it being the first time the two organizations have met together. During the two days the convention continues there will be addresses by a number of prominent speakers. Tomorrow both organizations will choose officers for the ensuing year.
