GENERAL NEWS.

The American Bar Association is in session at Hot Springs, Va.

The fourth annual reunion of the Spanish war nurses has just closed at San Francisco. One hundred attended.

Los Angeles is figuring on entertaining the next national convention of American bankers, at a cost to the local committee of \$5,000 cash.

It is claimed by manufacturers that there has been for a year past an overproduction of window glass and that the market is in bad shape.

Common seaweed has gained a foothold in the Louisiana rice fields and is developing into a great pest on those plantations within reach of tide water.

A safe was captured at Joplin, Mo., by federal authorities, who had \$53,000 in gold "located" therein, put there by a gang of swindlers. When opened it was found to be entirely empty.

The skeleton of "Russian Charlie," a well-known miner of Grant's Pass, was found, Thursday, after all search had been given up. He was lost in the mountains two years ago.

The hardest rain that ever fell at Grant's Pass, in the month of August, visited that place Thursday. Harvesting has been greatly delayed and much damage will result.

SNYDER RANCH CROP

NINE THOUSAND SACKS FINE WHEAT THIS YEAR.

All the Grain is Heavy, Clean and of Good Quality, as Was the Case Throughout the Entire Despain Gulch Country—Some Damage to Grain Because of Recent Rains.

Mack Williams, of Despain Gulch, was in the city today with wheat from the Snyder ranch. That ranch is sending four wagons to the city per day now with this year's yield, and has several days hauling yet before it gets the last sack into the warehouses. There were 9,000 sacks threshed this year on that ranch, and the yield ranged from 28 to 30 bushels.

The wheat was all good and heavy and will make good grain for the mills. Some of the wheat in the Despain neighborhood was heavier in yield than what was grown on this ranch as some of the fields ran as high as 35 bushels to the acre. Almost all of the grain in that part of the country was cut before the rain came, and therefore there was little or no damage done to the crops, but in the Cold Springs neighborhood there was a good deal of the wheat that was not cut by the time the rains came, and this is damaged to some extent. What grain was not cut will lose in weight and will bleach to a certain extent, even with as light a rain as the one of the first of the week. But as only a small portion of the fields had not been cut, the damage to the county will be little or nothing.

FOR BETTER EXPERIMENTS.

Food Commissioner Bailey Has Fitted Up a Laboratory.

Portland, Aug. 28.—J. W. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, is fitting up a new laboratory in the Breeden building, for the purpose of more extensive tests of the food products now on the market.

He has all the paraphernalia for the work, and in a few days will be able to test any article of food that is brought to him and give a complete analysis of its contents.

There is no fund available for this work, but Mr. Bailey will use the fines collected from law-breakers to keep the work going.

He is now at work on a new national law that is being framed in the interest of pure food and which he will submit to the Oregon delegation with a view of having it introduced into congress. He is in hopes of seeing it passed at the next session.

In 1904, at the St. Louis Exposition, he will work for the adoption of a similar law by foreign nations. There will be large delegations from all over the world in the country at this time, and the occasion will be right for introducing the subject for their consideration.

TO EDUCATE THE NEGRO.

Non-Partisan and Non-Racial Congress at Pensacola.

Pensacola, Fla., Aug. 28.—A negro educational congress to continue two days was formally opened here under the presidency of Rev. G. W. Lewis. The congress has for its chief purpose, as explained in the opening address, the furthering of negro education. It will eschew politics, and will deal entirely with the educational problem with the general purpose of elevating the negro race.

Some of the men of prominence who are expected to address the congress are J. W. Lyons, register of the United States treasury; Dr. I. B. Scott, editor of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, of New Orleans; Bishop J. W. Alstork, of Alabama; and Dr. J. M. Buckley, of New York.
