GOOD POTATO CROP

ARTICLE GROWN NEAR PENDLETON IS FIRST-CLASS.

Portland Market Filled Up With Unsalable Stuff—Dry Rot in Willamette Valley Districts—Refused Admission to Washington Markets.

The local potato crop which is now being received by Pendleton dealers is all first-class in every respect.

The potatoes coming in now are from the farms near town and on the foothills and were grown without irrigation. They are uniformly smooth and mealy and are free from dry rot or blight of any kind.

The later crop that comes from the irrigated districts is always more or less affected with dry rot, but little complaint even from the irrigated crop has been heard this year. Potatoes from the Tutuilla, Birch creek, McKay creek, Wild Horse and the Umatilla river farms above and below town, are of superior quality this year. While there is no heavy yield, the crop makes up in quality what it lacks in quantity. They are now selling at 14 cents per pound.

The foothill soil in this vicinity is especially adapted to potatoes as it produces a dry, smooth, well-flavored article, which is singularly free from pests or blight.

Portland markets are filled up with a poor quality it seems, and much of the entire crop in the western portion of the state is affected with some pest or blight, which spoils the market value. The Oregon Daily Journal, speaking of the subject, says:

"A new complication has been discovered in the Portland potato market. Examination of a large part of the late receipts of stock in this city shows that in a large part of the stock blight has appeared and some losses to shippers and growers have already occurred as a result. The blight is particularly noticeable in the stocks from the east side of the valley around Marion county and from the vicinity of Ridgefield. Two cars of stock from an Aurora dealer were found to be nearly worthless as a result of an attack of blight.

Several of the local commission men who shipped cars to the North during the week are mourning the loss of not only the money they paid for the stock but also the freight. The cars were examined by the Washington state inspector and found to be below the standard and were consequently confiscated. It is not all the stock that comes to the local market that is afflicted in this manner, but at least 25 per cent is. The other stocks arriving are in far better quality than heretofore received and the market is bearing up bravely even with the heavier receipts of the past few days.

South Has Cheap Stock. "According to Whop & Sons, the potato market in San Francisco continues weak for the riper Burbanks—the only shipping stock they have in that state. This Burbank does not in any way compare in quality with that of the Oregon Burbank—the stocks from this state being put in the top class. California Sallinas, the better grade, are in fair receipt in the southern market and meets with a very good demand at quotations considered fair."

TO RESURRECT L. A. W.

Decline in Bicycling Enthusiasm During Past Decade.

New York, Aug. 29.—A strong effort is to be made to give new life to the League of American Wheelmen, the once powerful organization which has been steadily falling off in membership and influence with the decline of bicycling during the last decade. The league has now reached such a low ebb that the annual meet, which was once the Derby event for cyclists throughout America, has this year been abandoned altogether.

Instead of the meet, however, the present regime has designated today to be observed as "League Day" simultaneously in every state in the Union. Races are to be given and meetings held at which plans will be discussed for the rejuvenation movement. The New York division is to give a banquet at Brighton Beach tonight, at which members from all parts of the state will meet in a grand rally. It is hoped that the banquet will give a new impetus to the league.
