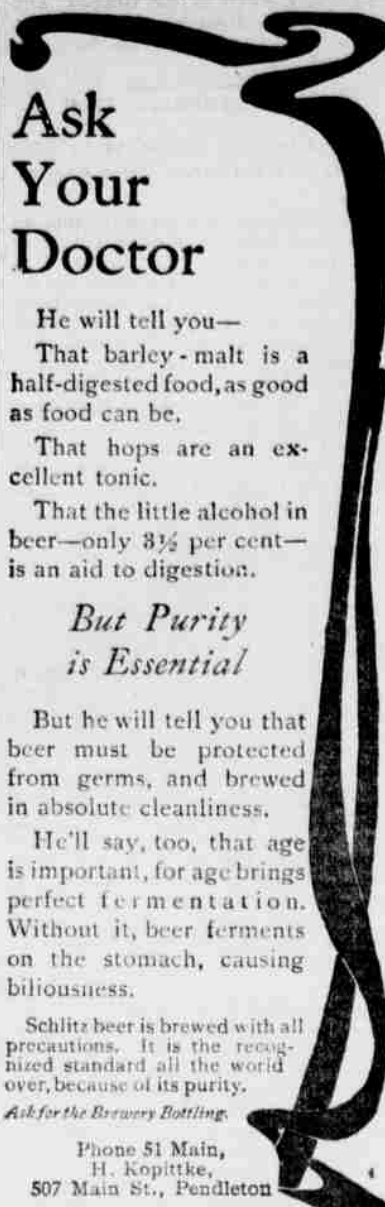

AN IRRIGATED FARM

OGDEN WILL HAVE A MODEL FOR THE DELEGATES.

Irrigation Congress to Prepare a Tract of Land for the Delectation of Visitors—Irrigation Machinery of Many Designs Will be in Use.

A model irrigated farm, practically an ideally illustrating intensive cultivation, is being put into perfect condition by the National Irrigation Congress, so that the delegates who attend the congress at Ogden, September 15th, may have a visual demonstration of the most approved and up-to-date methods of agriculture and horticulture under irrigation.

The plans of this exhibit are being made by a special committee appointed by the congress, which has given scientific attention to the work, under the able direction of State Engineer Doremus of Utah.

This model farm is laid out on land belonging to a state institution, where about 20 acres are used for the purpose of this illustration. Methods of taking water from the river, canal and laterals will be shown in a compact territory.

Modern devices for measuring and apportioning water will be shown, as well as the different methods of irrigation, by furrows, flood or check. Losses in transporting water will be measured. This usage of the water will be practically demonstrated with various kinds of growing crops, including grains and vegetables, luscious apples and late peaches.

Practical irrigators will accompany the delegates over the ground, explaining new inventions; various methods of spraying trees; of destroying orchard pests; and new methods of cultivation. A "current motor" will be in operation on the grounds and other irrigation machinery will be exhibited. It is thought that this model farm exhibit will be of interest to all the delegates, and especially to those who heretofore have had but a theoretical understanding of the principles of irrigation.

WILL AWARD PRIZES.

Colonel H. E. Dosch Will Be One of the General Committee.

Colonel Henry Dosch has been appointed a member of the committee which will award the four \$500 loving cups, 17 gold medals and numerous cash prizes at the National Irrigation Congress, which meets in Ogden September 15 to 18, inclusive, says the Oregon Daily Journal. The other members who will act as judges are Hon. Frederick W. Taylor, chairman chief department of agriculture of the St. Louis World's Fair; Hon. A. McPherson, fruit inspector of Idaho and the agricultural editor of the Chicago Tribune.

The colonel has also received an invitation to lecture before the congress on the subject, "Fungus Growths of Fruit Trees," and in all probability will do so. The indications are that the eleventh congress will be the most successful ever attempted and all of the 16 arid or semi-arid states will send delegates.

President Roosevelt has signified his willingness to attend and has also promised that the leading scientists and experts of the government will attend.

Meeting for Good Roads.

New Albany, Ind., Sept. 4.—The district horticultural and good roads institute under the direction of Purdue University School of Agriculture, began here today and will continue through tomorrow. This was "horticultural day" and the program includes a number of addresses on "Conditions of Success with Small Fruits," "Tomorrow, which will be "good roads day," the principal speaker will be W. H. Moore of St. Louis, president of the National Good Roads Association.

Where King and Emperor Meet.

Berlin, Sept. 4.—The Chateau of Wilhelmshöhe, near Cassel, where King Edward pays his present visit to Emperor William, is the old seat of electors of Hesse, and is renowned for its picturesque park and its beautiful gardens, with their famous fountains, which rival those at Herrenhausen, the royal domain near Hanover. Louis Napoleon resided at Wilhelmshöhe, as a state prisoner, from September, 1870, until February, 1871.

Lecturers to Organize.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 4.—The Leading lecturers, entertainers and concert people of the country are holding a convention in Steinway Hall, the object being to form a national organization. It is the first assembly of the kind ever held in this country.
