REGISTRY ROLLS OPEN.

List of Officers to Be Filled at Coming City Election.
The rolls for the registration of the voters at the coming municipal election opened today at the office of the city recorder.
At this election it will be necessary to provide for five councilmen to take the places of Messrs. Clopton, of the first ward, Hartman, of the second, Switzer, of the third, and Sewell and Howard, of the fourth. A mayor is also to be elected, as is a water commissioner to succeed William Jones, whose term expires at that time. There are five water commissioners on the board, and one is elected every two years for a term of 10 years. The qualifications for the office are that they be residents of the city for at least five years prior to the time of their election, and be owners of property to the value of at least \$2,500.
The rolls for the registry of the voters will be open for the next days, in the office of the city recorder.

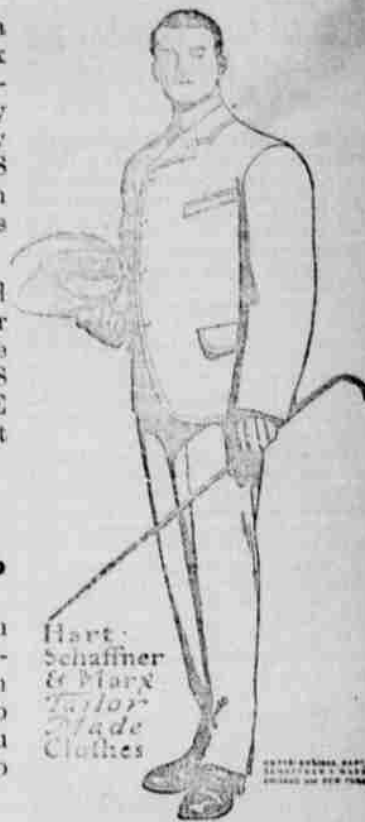
