ARCHBISHOP RYAN

OUTLINE OF CAREER OF REMARKABLE MAN.

Ordained a Priest When But Twenty-Two Years of Age—Has Been a Priest for Fifty Years—One of the Brightest Lights of Catholicism in America.

Philadelphia, Sept. 8.—Seldom or never before has Philadelphia been honored with a more notable gathering of high representatives of the Roman Catholic church than that which met today to do honor to Archbishop Ryan, the venerable head of the archdiocese of Philadelphia, on the occasion of the golden jubilee of his priesthood. Plans which have been making for weeks, and even months past culminated in a glorious ecclesiastical service in the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul this morning. Shortly after 9 o'clock priests and prelates to a total of more than 100, all garbed in full vestments, marched in procession from the chapel to the Cathedral, where pontifical high mass was to be celebrated in honor of Archbishop Ryan. Among those in the procession were archbishops, bishops and other prelates of high rank, representing not only the Philadelphia archdiocese, but also many other parts of the country. The Cathedral itself was crowded to its fullest capacity, those present including many of the foremost citizens of Philadelphia.

The ceremonies were those customary to the occasion. The venerable archbishop himself was the celebrant of the mass, and the sermon was preached by Bishop Horstmann, of Cleveland, formerly chancellor of the Philadelphia archdiocese. After mass congratulatory addresses were presented on behalf of the clergy and laity of the archdiocese. Another feature of the celebration was the reading of felicitous messages from Pope Pius and from Cardinal Gibbons. Cardinal Gibbons had expected to take a prominent part in the celebration, but was prevented by his trip to Rome. The celebration concludes this evening with a large reception in honor of the visiting clergy at the archiepiscopal residence.

A Priest at 22.
The Most Reverend Patrick John Ryan is a native of Thurles, Ireland, and was born February 20, 1831. He was educated at Carlow College, in his native country, and coming to America, was raised to the priesthood in St. Louis Cathedral, September 8, 1853, when less than 23 years old. Though the canonical age is 24, an exception was made in his case on account of his brilliant talents.

His first mission was at the Cathedral of St. Louis, and for 19 years he was stationed there and at the Church of the Annunciation and St. John's church, all in St. Louis. Archbishop Kendrick who had watched the career of Father Ryan very carefully, saw in him a worthy successor for the see of St. Louis, and while attending the vatican council he asked Pius IX for his appointment as coadjutor with the right of succession. The request was granted, and on April 14, 1872, he was consecrated in the Cathedral of St. Louis by Archbishop Kenrick. But he was not destined to fill that see, for upon the death of Archbishop Wood, of Philadelphia, he was appointed by Leo XIII, in 1884, to that archdiocese and was fully installed as archbishop of Philadelphia by being invested with the pallium the following year.

COTTON BUYERS ORGANIZE.

Movement to Amalgamate All the Minor Organizations.
Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 8.—The meeting called for Memphis today to organize a national association of cotton buyers is regarded as the most important of its kind yet held. Buyers' organizations have existed for some time in various sections of the South and now it is proposed to amalgamate all of these district organizations into one association to cover Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas, the two territories, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and the Carolinas.

It is said not to be the purpose of the association to control prices, but to provide for a uniform method of handling cotton. It is believed, however, that the association will have a strong influence in maintaining equitable prices.

BATTLE MONUMENT

COMMEMORATES EVENT OF GREAT IMPORTANCE.

Battle of Lake George Was the Principal Event in the Last Great Indian War Preceding the Revolution—Monument Was Erected by the Society of Colonial Wars.

Lake George, N. Y., Sept. 8.—With elaborate ceremonies and in the presence of the president of the United States, the governors of several states and numerous other guests of note, the 148th anniversary of the battle of Lake George was celebrated here today by the unveiling of the Lake George Battle Monument, erected by the Society of Colonial Wars of the State of New York. The event was made the occasion for a notable military demonstration participated in by soldiers of the regular army, the New York national guard and several semi-military organizations of New York, Massachusetts, Vermont and Connecticut, the four states whose troops took part in the historic battle.

The first feature of the day's program was a reception in honor of President Roosevelt, Governor Odell and the other eminent guests held at the new Fort William Henry Hotel. The remainder of the forenoon was occupied by the military parade and review, which was under the com-

The unveiling ceremonies were of a simple but impressive character. The speakers included Senator Dewey, who delivered the oration of the day, Governor Odell, of New York, Governor McCullough, of Vermont, Governor Bates, of Massachusetts, J. William Beekman, Governor of the Society of Colonial Wars in the state of New York, and a number of others. The monument consists of a mammoth granite pedestal surmounted by heroic bronze figures designed by Albert Weinert. The figures, which are nine feet in height and weigh nearly 4,000 pounds, represent the Indian King Hendrick, demonstrating to General Johnson the unwisdom of dividing his forces. The monument occupies a conspicuous location in the State Park, standing on ground sloping to wards the lake and is discernible for several miles.
