Mr. and Mrs. Coppock returned home Friday, accompanied by Mrs. Coppock's sister, Mrs. Curtis, of this city, who will spend a few days visiting her sister and father.

Mrs. Areta Plamondon stumbled on a splintered board in the sidewalk, running a large splinter into her foot. She was unable to walk for several days.

Daniel Gholson and daughter, of Albia, Iowa, have been visiting at the home of Mr. Gholson's brother, William Gholson, of this city, for several days. Uncommonly Fine Wheat. David Taylor, who for years has been engaged in the wheat business in this city, says the heaviest wheat he has ever handled is coming in this year. A few days ago Arthur Scott sold and delivered to Mr. Taylor 410 sacks of wheat that weighed

out 154 pounds to the sack for the 410 sacks. Mr. Taylor drew a check for \$725.55. It tested 67 pounds to the bushel and one draft of five sacks weighed 794 pounds, an average of about 159 pounds to the sack.

INDIANA BANKERS.

Ninth Annual Session Has Met, at South Bend.

South Bend, Ind., Sept. 9.—For the first time in its history the Indiana Bankers' Association, organized in 1895, is holding its annual meeting outside of Indianapolis. Representative bankers and financiers from every section of the state filled the banqueting room of the Hotel Oliver this morning at 10 o'clock when the convention was called to order by the president, R. L. O'Hair, of Greencastle.

After the visitors had been welcomed by Mayor Fogarty the convention listened to the annual address of President O'Hair, which dealt in an interesting and exhaustive way with many of the leading financial questions of the present day. Other addresses of the session were delivered by S. R. Flynn, president of the National Livestock Board; by W. W. Hart, of Indianapolis, on "The Relation of the Commonwealth to State Financial Institutions," and by J. A. L. Pollard, of Fort Madison, Ia., on "Rubber Currency." The session tomorrow promises to be a most interesting one. The scheduled speakers include United States Senator Beveridge, of Indiana, and Congressman Fowler, of New Jersey.
