The race war has started in London. A negro is accused of robbing a white man and taking the matter into court.

Judge Charles E. Plummer, a prominent democrat leader in Minnesota, is dead at St. Paul. He was 75 years old.

Coal operators of the Wyoming valley region, have advised an increase in the price of coal to \$1.00 per ton.

The high court of the United States, which is now at Buffalo, N. Y., is discussing the advisability of creating a court of women foresters.

Miss Sadie Knowlton of Boston, has broken the world's cycling record for women for 1,000 miles, making that circuit in 26 hours and 55 minutes. The old record is broken by three hours and 15 minutes.

The American ship, E. F. Barrett, arrived in Portland Wednesday from Nushagak, Alaska, with 23 cases of salmon on board.

Mrs. W. O. Elliott, of Dallas, is under arrest in Portland for leading her daughter into a life of shame in the Whitechapel district in Portland.

The Spanish line of boats, on the Columbia between The Dalles and Portland, has been in the landing at Lyle with barbed wire, to prevent the regular line of boats from landing there.

Nineteen Japanese hoppers, of Woodburn, armed with knives, guns and clubs, chased the proprietors out of the field and into the city, Wednesday, in a difficulty over pricing, prices and regulations.

The dead body of an infant, wrapped in a newspaper, was found in a vacant lot in San Francisco, Wednesday morning. A young society woman was seen coming from the spot by a policeman.

Mrs. L. J. Tromley, whose husband was tarred and feathered at Hillsboro, last week, for immoral conduct, has been arrested for luring up her residence, on which she had several hundred dollars insurance.
