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YOUNG NOBLE SPRIG

LORD BROOKE, OF WARWICK COMES OF AGE.

Event is Celebrated With the Usual Empty Social Function—Young Man Ran Away From Home to Go to War—A Newspaper Correspondent Also.

London, Sept. 10.—There are great goings-on this week at Warwick Castle, the magnificent seat of the Earl and Countess of Warwick. Lord Brooks, the eldest son of the earl and countess, and heir to the title and estates of his father, comes of age today and the event is being celebrated with a great house party as such events are by custom celebrated in these lales.

Lord Brooks is of a lively, energetic temperament and appears to have inherited more of the qualities of his famous mother than those of his father, the earl, who is a quiet and reserved man. In the days of his early youth about Leminington, near where Warwick Castle is located, and later at Eton, Lord Brooks was regarded as a frail, delicate boy of a quiet disposition. But as his years increased he soon showed that he was possessed of "ideas" like his attractive mother.

When refused permission to volunteer for South Africa, he ran away, and his fur overcoat and trinkets, to buy a ticket to Durban, merely leaving a note explaining his intention to enlist in one of the irregular corps of cavalry. He was forgotten, and receiving on arrival in Durban a commission that attached him to the staff of one of the commanding officers. During the troublous times in Serbia following the assassination of King Alexander, Lord Brooks served with credit as the correspondent at Belgrade of the Times.

AMATEUR ATHLETICS.

Annual Meeting of the Unions of the United States.

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 10.—A great crowd was present today at the opening of the annual national championship meet of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States. Several reasons combine to make the present meet, which lasts through tomorrow, the most interesting in the history of the well known organization. To begin with, it is the first time in many years that the national meet has been held in the West.

This gives an opportunity not often afforded of bringing together the crack amateurs of the East and the West on the home grounds of the latter. Then, again, Canada has sent a team of her best athletes and hopes to return across the border with the seals of the Americans dangling at its belts. The Canada team consists of four members of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Club—Peck, Craig, Molson and Moreau.

In Memory Empress of Austria.
Vienna, Sept. 10.—A low requiem anniversary mass for the repose of the soul of the late Empress Elizabeth of Austria, who was assassinated at Geneva, September 10, 1898, was held today in the cathedral. The service was attended by Emperor Francis Joseph and the other members of the royal family who happened to be in the capital. Similar services were held by the Austrian embassies in the various capitals of Europe.

FRUIT MEN MEET

AMERICAN POMOLOGICAL SOCIETY IN SESSION.

New Plans of Marketing Fruits Now Being Considered in Boston—Want Greater Effort Manifested Among Horticulturists.

Boston, Sept. 10.—Prominent fruit-growers of many states are attending the annual convention of the American Pomological Society, which began a three days' session in Boston today. The society, which is one of the oldest and largest in its special field of study, has heretofore held annual competitions in the exhibition of standard fruits and also of new and hybridized varieties. Commencing with the present year a new plan has been adopted for the conduct of these competitions, which is expected to be a decided aid in stimulating efforts in all lines of horticulture.

What is called the "ad interim" method of competitions has been adopted. Hitherto it has been possible for competitors to show only such varieties as the annual competitions as may ripen and so in prime condition at the time when the meeting is held. This shut out a vast number of meritorious products. For instance, only one or two of the remarkable achievements of Luther Burbank in the way of new hybridized fruits, some of which have made quick fortunes for nurserymen and orchardists, have been shown at the annual meetings, the long distance and the climate of California not permitting his work to be entered in competition.

The "ad interim" plan will permit any investigator to have his work examined by a committee of experts at the time when his fruit is in the best condition to show it. It will be examined by a committee, which will report to the annual meeting, and another committee will give it consideration and estimate its claims in the general competition for honors.

"THE BURGOMASTER."

Story of Old Peter Stuyvesant to Be Retold Here September 21.

When good old Peter Stuyvesant was governor of New Amsterdam, he used to stomp around merrily on a wooden leg and endeavor to show that he was as active as the most athletic youth in the province. He would go to the routs and dances and cavort on the floor as merrily as any of the young people. He never let his wooden leg interfere with his pleasure.

Two years ago when William H. Crane was about to produce a play based on the adventures of Peter Stuyvesant, he practiced walking on a wooden leg during the summer time, wishing to make the character as historically correct as possible. Crane discovered that the wooden leg would make him strap his own mother extremely close up to his body and that the strapping up gave him excruciating pains. The play was a rank failure and so Mr. Crane was spared the necessity of practicing further.

When the great musical comedy success, "The Burgomaster," was produced in Chicago, William Norris, who first essayed the character, was faced with the same problem. Mr. Norris solved it by wearing a long cloak, letting the supposed wooden leg hang naturally at the knee and wearing a sword at such an angle that the good leg was effectively concealed. That is the reason why the burgomaster in the opera always wears a long cloak. Every man who plays the part finds that he has trouble in dancing with the wooden leg. Oscar J. Pimagan, who will be the burgomaster in the big revival of "The Burgomaster," which will be seen at Frazer's Opera House, September 21, has become very expert in this line.

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
