## WORK IS BEHIND

SCHOOLS MAY NOT BE READY TO OPEN MONDAY.

Work of installing the Heating Plant is by No Means Completed—Painting of Floors Unfinished—Desks Are Not in Place—Will Test Heating Plant Before Work is Accepted by Board.

The school teachers are nearly all here and are ready to begin business on the first of the coming week, but from the appearance of the high school building, at least it will be some days before the bells will ring and the young folks begin to learn the tasks appointed for them.

The heating plant at that building is yet in its infancy. It is not nearly so far advanced as the furnace in the hall of the basement and has not as yet been put in place. The holes have been punched in the walls and floors for the heaters, but no connections have been made and it will take a week of hard work to get them all in position and tested.

And the other work is as far behind the schedule as the heating part of the program. On the upper floor the painters are today putting on the second coat of floor paint and have quite a big job to do before they finish with that job. There is part of the first floor that has to have a second coat and part that has as yet to receive the first. The carpenter work is not all done and the place has a torn-up appearance in general and an unready look in particular.

The desks of the entire school have been put in the assembly hall back of the main building and are there being painted and varnished. There are 500 of them and perhaps a little more than half have been finished. The painter has been working at the desks for the last three weeks and it is a tedious piece of work to get all of the ironwork done neatly. It will be several days yet before the desks are finished and dry enough for use. After that they will have to be put back in their places in the rooms.

However, when the work is all done, the building will be in good shape for the opening of the school for the entire structure. Has been investigated and found to be in the best possible condition. The floors will have been all given a thorough dressing of floor paint and the walls cleaned and put in good order. Many alterations have been made in the interior so that the place will be as convenient as possible for the way it is arranged.

#### Basement to Be Used.

The two front rooms of the basement are being painted and fitted for the use of the school as study and recitation rooms the same as the ones on the upper floors, but the two rear rooms have not been changed, and it is the intention of Professor Conklin to have them converted into a manual training department and a laboratory for the use of the members of the high school.

As soon as the other work is out of the way and there is time, the rooms will be fitted up and in time will be made into important departments of the training work of the institution.

The work on the other buildings of the city is farther along and it is hoped that they will be able to open on time, but even then the men are still putting the finishing touches on their summer's work. The high school building was where the most of the work was done, however, and there they are the farthest behind time.

It is the intention of Professor Conklin to test the heating plant when it is installed and if there is any fault in the working of it that is not right or if there comes from it fumes that will be detrimental to the health or comfort of the pupils, the contractors will have to remedy it. A defect before the work will be accepted by the board. As soon as the system is in working order a test will be made of the air after it has been sent through the furnace and it will be decided until it comes through as pure as it goes in. If there is any need of doctoring.

It was the intention of Professor Conklin this morning to call the school together Monday morning and have the registration attended to so that in case the real work of the school would have to be put off for a time there would be no more delay than was necessary when the sessions could be commenced.

Most of the teachers are either in the city or have signified their intention of starting for the city so that they will be here in plenty of time for the work of the first day, and as soon as the work at the big building on the hill can be put out of the way everything will start off smoothly for the work of the year for all else to be in the way of preparing for the year has been done.

#### STOLE AN OVERCOAT.

F. P. Rea, of St. Louis, Says He Lost His Garment at the Pendleton.

Yesterday afternoon, on leaving an overcoat belonging to F. P. Rea, of St. Louis, was taken from his room at the Pendleton, he says, and at this time there is no clue to the thief. Mr. Rea came to the hotel from the afternoon train and went to his room, where he left his things and went to

his dinner. While he was gone some one entered the room, though it is said the door was locked, and took from it the overcoat, after rummaging among the other things in the room.

The overcoat was a valuable one, having cost \$47.50, and was made by a tailor in St. Louis. It was a light brown top coat, lined with brown surrah silk, and the cloth was in a soft finish with a very slight nap.

There is no clue to the man who took the coat, other than that a small man in common clothes was seen to knock on the door of a room on the first floor, but receiving no answer, went on up stairs. Whether or not that was the man it is not known. A reward of \$10 will be given for the recovery of the coat or the conviction of the thief.

#### To Furnish Five More.

J. Clove, of the firm of Rigby-Clove, has returned from Moro and other points in Sherman county, where he went in the interest of his combined harvesting. The firm had one of the machines at Moro and Mr. Clove went there to see how it had done during the harvest. He found that the work was satisfactory and while in the county took contracts to furnish five of the farmers of that county with machines before the coming harvest.

The plaintiff alleges that the defendant has possession of the land wrongfully and asks for \$5,000 damages and the costs of the action.
