WOMEN'S CLUB NOTES.

During the various illness of the state secretary, the State Federation has not had any of its meetings, and as no report of the results of the year convention has been published, excepting a part of the minutes, the clubs have little idea of what was really done at Astoria.

For the first time in the history of the women's club work in Oregon, Pendleton is not the official headquarters, but the chairmanship of two important state committees are held here. Mrs. J. Halley, Jr., on the education and Mrs. H. S. Burroughs on the traveling library committee.

Mrs. C. B. Wade has been appointed by Mrs. Gray, the new state president, as press correspondent for the federation journal. The club journal of Portland, was adopted by the federation as its official organ. The journal starts out under new management this year, and the state board and the standing committee will make use of its columns to communicate with the clubs.

As soon as possible a list of the new officers and standing committee will be published in the journal, probably in the October number.

The journal should be in the hands of every club woman that wishes to keep posted on the club interests of the state.

On our local clubs the Current Literature is the first to meet. The first meeting was held on Wednesday afternoon of this week at the home of Mrs. W. J. Fornish.

The Thursday Afternoon Club year will begin September 23, meeting at the home of Mrs. J. B. Ross.

The Woman's Club will not meet until the second Tuesday in October. Mr. Turner, of the Art Exhibit, has been corresponding with Mrs. Whiteley, the chairman of the committee here regarding another exhibit in Pendleton. The matter will be brought before the club next week.

Should the club and state another exhibit there is no doubt that the next year offered by Mr. Turner for the year ending from January 1904 to January 1905 would come here in Pendleton. A report was the best of the year of 1903. The price is \$200 worth of pictures, of cards and cards and greatly to the attractiveness of our school rooms. 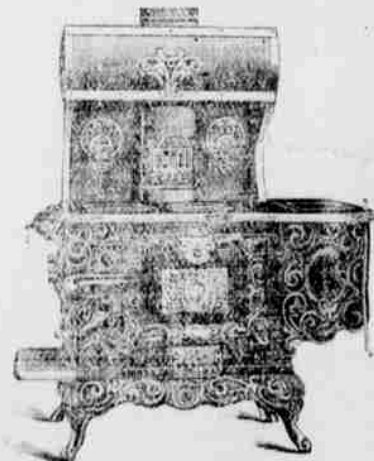
